



Romans Rejuvenated

Join Pastor David and me as we begin our summer time (June 26-August) study of the first epistle in the New Testament. The Epistle to the Romans is known not only as Paul’s longest letter, but also the weightiest. Subsequently it has often been deemed as his most influential.

It is believed by most mainstream theologians that Paul wrote this letter at the height of his career, sometime between 54-58 A.D. Stanley Olsen from Luther Northwestern Seminary states in his commentary that:

“Romans, like all the other Pauline letters, is tied to particular historical contexts—the author’s, the addressees’, and the relationship between the two. Paul’s context includes his controversial work among gentiles and his teaching about freedom from the law. . . Minimally, in considering the purpose of Romans, we may be sure that the letter addresses Christians and that it responds to real problems. Paul wrote to Christians and sought to reaffirm what they knew and believed—to strengthen—not to convert. Paul intended to bring the illumination of the gospel into Christians’ everyday lives. “

Things certainly haven’t changed, have they? Today as Christ followers we are to turn not only to God in prayer and to community for support, but also to the words of inspiration which we find in our ancient and sacred text, the scriptures. We hope that you will journey with us on the summer roads of Rome.

So, you've had over a year to contemplate the question, "What are you waiting for?" Have you figured it out? Has God spoken into your life to give you direction? Are you rejuvenated and ready to serve our Lord in a greater capacity with your life?

On May 1st I shared with the congregation a vision for strengthening the missions outreach at Crozet Baptist Church. We all have experiences of suffering and needing comfort. Some of my favorite verses of Scripture are found in II Corinthians 1: 3 – 7 where Paul talks about God giving us comfort so we can offer comfort to others in the same way God meets our needs. The question arises, how can we at CBC be proactive about reaching out to our church and community to provide help to those who need comfort or healing?

Nine years ago, four of us from this church met early one morning to pray. We shared our hopes for this church. We shared the ways in which God has gifted each of us to reach out in love to others. We shared our dream for what it would look like for this church to become more active in the Crozet community, helping to share God's love, compassion, and healing touch with others. We had a vision for a "community outreach center" – a "Hope and Healing Center."

This would be a center that would encompass the outreach ministries of this church with an administrator who could oversee the efforts of many volunteers who have a passion to help others. With a coordinator who has strong administrative skills, we could capture all of the wonderful potential of this church body and help each person find their heart's passion for being all God has called him or her to be. The administrator, along with a team of volunteers, could organize outreach ministries to meet the needs of this community in a powerful and helpful way.

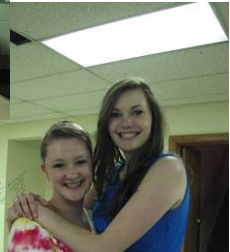
Examples of these outreach ministries are Life Skills training classes such as parenting, marriage enrichment, healthy living, managing finances or job interviewing skills. We could offer discipleship

training seminars such as learning to forgive, nurturing a prayer life, learning to study the Bible, learning to manage anger and stress following sound Biblical principles. The Hope and Healing Center could offer support groups to help people deal with grief, various addictions, single parenting, healing from physical, emotional, or sexual abuse. We could offer English as a second language classes for newcomers to the states, or after school tutoring for struggling students. Perhaps someone would contact the center needing help filling out complicated social service, disability or nursing home placement forms. We could coordinate volunteers willing to accompany people for physician appointments, or to drive someone to the grocery store, or to visit homebound community members who are lonely.

The Hope and Healing Center would be an open door to offer practical, everyday assistance to people in need. It would offer a walking-alongside others in a way that would tangibly show people that the body of Christ at CBC loves them with the love of God. The dream is that in the future, other area churches and organizations would want to participate in the services offered as we work together to build up the Kingdom of God.

We realize that this Hope and Healing Center will need financial support, volunteer support, time, and patience. But we are trusting God with these challenges. We trust that God has brought us this far in our vision and will continue to see this project to completion according to His good, pleasing and perfect will. We wait, we work, we anticipate and we participate in God's transforming Kingdom work. We invite you to join us in making this vision a reality.

Why Canada?

Crozet Baptist has, for years, been taking kids on the road every other year. The destinations are chosen and deposits made a year in advance for budgeting and planning purposes. The organization we have partnered with, Group Work Camps, has even more planning to do to ready service sites and coordinate with area partnering agencies and begins. Their process begins more than two years in advance!

Though we have often traveled to the Western states, we have chosen to stick a little closer to home due to the extreme increase in travel expenses. This year we will be traveling to Cornwall Canada. At a mere 664 miles we can make the trip by car in a reasonable amount of time.

From Group regarding their ideology: *Nothing seems to spark spiritual growth like putting one's Christian faith into action. And, when students are pushed out of their comfort zones, away from the distractions of*

home, God gets through to them. With carefully planned evening programs, devotions and service projects, young people hear God's Word...do God's Word...and experience transformation.

Workcamps are designed to deepen one's walk with Christ, while serving people in Christ's name. It's not so much about the "service projects" (although the challenge is important); it's more about God changing the lives of the people you serve...and the hearts of your students. The "work" fades, but the impact of selfless service and new relationships lasts! Our purpose is to come alongside youth leaders and provide experiences where young people grow in Christian faith and character, emerge as leaders, and have loads of fun at the same time.

Join us in praying for our upcoming trip to serve in the name of Christ.

For several months the Buildings and Grounds Committee has been working hard to fulfill the church's mandate to rent the brick parsonage. The committee has been in dialogue with several property management companies and has been following their recommendations about upgrades and repairs to the house. Several important projects have been completed, including removing most of the contents, painting the interior, and repairing loose tiles in the upstairs bathroom.

The committee was making great progress, but then the process slowed down. Lack of rental income made additional upgrades and repairs unworkable, yet our property management advisors said we weren't ready to rent because we still needed to make a few upgrades and repairs. Now, however, a great opportunity has presented itself, an opportunity that as the church's representatives they could not afford to pass up.

About two years ago, pastor Colleen's mother, sister, and two nieces moved to Crozet to be closer to all of the family. They did not buy or build right away because they wanted to familiarize themselves to the area before they made a long term commitment. They

have come to love the area and plan to stay here, but the lease on their current house is ending and they aren't prepared to build yet. So they have graciously agreed to rent our parsonage "as is" for the next twelve to eighteen months.

This is a wonderful opportunity for them and us, and the church will benefit in several ways. First, there will be someone in the house. We all know that empty houses do not fare well. Second, they have agreed to assist with needed improvements by supervising projects and doing some of the work themselves. The cost for the projects will come directly out of their rent. Third, we will all benefit from Leslie's design expertise. She is a professional design consultant for both commercial and residential properties.

Most of you have already had the chance to meet Alice, Leslie, Alex, and Jade. You know what committed, hard-working, and loving folk they are. Imagine what a great pleasure it will be to have them as our new neighbors. They will be moving in around the tenth of June. Take a moment to speak a word of welcome and let them know how much you appreciate their presence at CBC.

It's been 5 months... since we re-launched our Food and Friendship ministry. We made a six-month commitment to 18 local families referred to us through the family support workers at Crozet Elementary School, in addition to anyone who comes to our door for emergency food assistance and a few neighbors with long term needs.

Of the original 18 families, two have moved from the area, two did not need assistance last month, and one family had relatives with two small children move in with them. That is approximately 35 children, ages 1 through middle school, and 34 adults. We pack three or four bags per family and an additional 12 bags (2 per family) for Deb to distribute during the month. Seven CBC families volunteered and are

now delivering groceries once a month. More CBCers have volunteered to help and we're looking forward to taking them up on their offer.

After talking with the counselor at Crozet Elementary, we would like to extend our partnership to provide groceries to our neighbors for an additional two months, July and August. I hope you attended Sara's couponing class because we really need to restock the shelves. With the generous financial gifts to support the food pantry, team members can do some extra shopping and take advantage of sale prices. We're also planning some food drives.

We'll start packing groceries Monday evening, June 13 for the families to whom we deliver. Then the following Monday, June 20 we'll pack for the families who pick up at the church. If you'd like to help contact Pat Gaertner, 823-6438, or email me: patgaertner@embarqmail.com. **Thanks so much!**

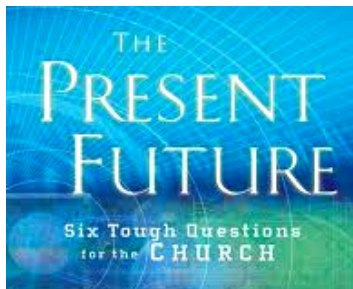


Summer Study starts July 3 Pastor Colleen

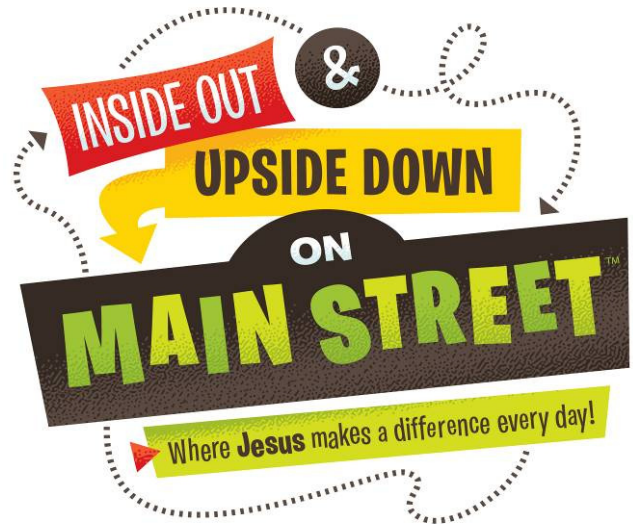
