CLINIC MARCH 9-10: One month until the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association Fifth Annual Clinic! We hope you have made your plans to attend and bring the team along, the assistant coach and the coach "down the road" with you. Enclosed you will find a brochure about the speakers, topics, times, etc.. Show it to your principal and superintendent and make sure you get the day off to enjoy a weekend of baseball.

BANQUET TICKETS: Enclosed you will find a card to return so we can make a reservation for you for the Friday banquet and noon lunch on Saturday. Fill it out and mail it back with your check covering your meals. If you plan to eat both Friday and Saturday meals, your check should be for \$4.75. If you plan to eat for only the banquet, it would be \$3.00 and if plans are for only the Saturday lunch it should be \$1.75. To make a reservation for meals, you must enclose your check. Some cards have already been returned indicating the coach plans to attend the meals, but enclosing no fee. No reservation can be made without enclosing your check. KANSAS CITY ROYALS ACADEMY TRYOUTS: Iowa youths who have not yet reached their 20th birthday and have completed their high school eligibility are invited to participate in a series of tryout camps spensored by the Royals in the Hawkeye state this summer.

The Academy, only institution of its kind in the world, is located in Sarasota, Fla. Youths selected in the tryouts will be sent there for a 16-month course with all expenses paid. They also will receive a salary. Dates and sites for the Iowa trials have not been selected but they will not be held prior to June 1.

Five mornings a week the students at the Academy are occupied with college courses while their afternoons are devoted to baseball. The players selected this summer will make up the fourth class at the Academy. 

Make every effort to get it to him.

TO BE RELEASED FEBRUARY 16, 1973

CEDAR RAPIDS: Seven new members of the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association "Hall of Fame" will be formally honored at the banquet March 9 in Cedar Rapids featuring the Association's Fifth Annual Clinic.

In announcing the names of the honorees, Association Executive Secretary Harold Primrose said: "Again this year we are privileged to present seven men whose names loom large in the playing, coaching, and umpiring of baseball in Iowa over long period of years. Each was a standout. All share with previous men named to the Hall of Fame a record of unselfish achievement in whatever capacity they were privileged to serve. We are proud of them all."

Alphabetically, the seven men are Everett Barr of Algona, Jay R. Beekmann of Storm Lake, Alex Evans of Manson, Bill Holmstrom of Clinton, Orval J. Madden of Alton, Merle E. "Midge" McKeever of Delaware and Frank Tvrdik of Cedar Rapids.

Standout player on the list is MC KEEVER, whose three varsity years at Coe College are still talked about, notably his .563 batting average in 1922. From that springboard McKeever played professionally from Class D to Class AAA baseball as a catcher and second baseman. He was an adept base-stealer with a high of 67 in 1925. Retiring as a player, McKeever coached Davenport High School baseball, winning 3 state titles and placing twice as runner-up in eight seasons. In all, McKeever umpired 30 years, coached 38 years. Now 73 years old, McKeever lives in retirement in Delaware.

JAY BEEKMANN was another player with professional talent as a pitcher in his youthful days as evidenced by several fine seasons with the celebrated Storm Lake White Caps plus the fact that when Buena Vista College launched it's athletic "Hall of Fame" in 1969 Beekman was in the first group to be honored. But his greatest career service to baseball was in the field of coaching, administration and leadership. As athletic director and baseball coach of Buena Vista College since 1955, Beekman's teams have rated national attention time after time and led to a series of well-deserved honors for their coach. Active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Beekman is an ordained elder in the Presbyterian church of Storm Lake.

Contribution of time, effort and leadership to American Legion baseball is the highlight of FRANK TVRDIK's career. Since 1935 he has been "Mr. Legion Baseball" in Cedar Rapids with a record which now reads 622 wins, 132 losses, eleven state titles and national runnerup in 1971. Tvrdik was noted for players he developed such as Dick Rozek, Hal Trosky, Frank Stastny, Bob Stastny, Bob Tvrdik, Tom Farmer and many others. A third baseman in his playing days, Tvrdik has been associated with baseball in a variety of capacities since 1918.

A man with a protegee pitching in the majors is Athletic Director BILL HOLMSTROM of Clinton High School. Prior to going full-time to administration at Clinton in 1969, H olmstrom's City High baseball teams in Iowa City won 233 games, lost 89, played two ties and finished runnerup to Abe Lincoln of Council Bluffs for the 1959 state title. Veteran reliefer Eddie Watt of the Baltimore Orioles is one of Holmstrom's "boys". He was at Clarence 4 years before going to City High.

Off a busy 34-year-background of coaching and administration, ORVAL J. MADDEN of Alton Floyd Valley High School first started up the baseball ladder as a pitcher, making the switch to coaching after giving the old Nebraska State League a whirl. Over the years at Auburn, Little Rock, Osage and Alton, Madden has been involved in almost every facet of the game, managing and coaching Junior Legion, Midget, town teams and semi-pro teams along with high school coaching, fund-raising, conducting clinics and a wide variety of other worthwhile projects. He's been connected with baseball since he was 12.

Anyone who ever attended clinics or state tournaments at Manson since 1941 will nod agreement with this word that ALEX EVANS, the guiding spirit behind those activities at Manson, is a Hall of Fame nominee this year. Evans did a remarkable job in putting clinics together with top major league talent like George Sisler, Lew Fonseca, Spees Torporcer and others on hand to teach. He went after the big names and he got them. A Decorah native and athlete under the late Doc Dorman at Upper Iowa College, Evans got his coaching start at Central City in 1921 and after serving at Grundy Center went to Manson in 1940. As coach there, he produced outstanding high school and Legion teams.

Proving that something nice can happen to umpires, EVERETT BARR of Algona makes the Hall of Fame off a background of superlative work in that role. Rated with the very finest umpires in Iowa history, Barr also coached successful Junior Legion baseball at Algona, served as commissioner of the Iowa Junior College association, directed the Algona city recreation program and taught sports officiating in Algona's adult education program. But Everett Barr is in the Hall of Fame primarily as an umpire, a field in which his work served as a standard of comparison and met the test well.

Others named previously to the Association's Hall of Fame are Otto Vogel, Dr. Harry Simmer and L. A. "Lefty" Schnack, all deceased, along with Hal Trosky, Sr., Joe Bailey, Bud Suter, Hap Miller, Roy F. Jessen, Ken Blackman, Emil Klumpar, Hamlet Peterson, Mon Whitford, Fred Larsen, Harold Schmickley, Vince Meyer, Elmer Starr, Cap Timm, George Thomson, Estel Thomson, Chick Sutherland, Dick Davis and Ray Manship.
