PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The Test of Time

Dennis and I took a trip to France this past August. It was a river cruise on the Seine, and every day we went on shore excursions that were just amazing. Our guides had so much knowledge about the places we toured. It was actually impossible to remember everything they were teaching us.

One of the things we were quickly reminded of, was how young we are as the United State of America in comparison to a place like France. Since we are less than 300 years old, we are actually pretty naïve as a nation. The reach of time in France is much longer and it has a much larger story to tell.



I recently found a picture on my phone that I took of the Cathedral de'Notre Dame in Rouen France (not to be confused with the one in Paris). Construction of a church began on its site as early as 395 CE. Think about that! The construction of the existing Cathedral began in the late 1020's, which makes it over 1000 years old.

This Cathedral has seen a lot in the course of human history. Built as an extraordinary, extravagant (albeit imperfect) symbol of Christian faith and worship, this "church" of God was a focal point of life in Rouen. Its caretakers, spiritual leaders, and parishioners gathered there for more generations than have ever even existed in the United States of America.

Those generations saw life's joys and sorrows and the rise and fall of kings and tyrants. The church endured destruction by fires and storms. The faith community was harmed by religious corruption. And after the French revolution in 1796, the Cathedral even experienced hostile takeover when Christian worship was temporarily replaced by a new belief system called "the cult of reason." At the beginning of WWII in 1939, the Cathedral authorities did what they could to protect the building before the bombings began. They placed sandbags in front of many of the sculptures and removed as many stained-glass windows as they could and stored them far from the city.



On our tour we were brought to the gate of one of the chapels that was built during the Middle Ages on the east side of the Cathedral. It was the chapel of the Virgin Mary. At the front of the chapel stood statues of Mary and Joseph, and there was a beautiful painting of the Holy Family – like the one we see on many Christmas cards this time of year. Regardless of one's theology about the Virgin Mary today, this place was very important to the people who lived during the time of the Black Plague when they sought the protection of Mary. As I looked upon this chapel, I reflected on the story of God's salvation through Jesus, and how it has been preserved there for more than 700 years. It seemed to me to be an incredible witness to God's gift of enduring hope for humanity.

The Cathedral in Rouen is beautiful. But what is most beautiful to me is the fact that it has survived for more than a thousand years and counting. The generations who helped its survival, have not been perfect. Some of them were faithful. Some of them were not. They experienced the destructive forces that threatened its very existence, and they rebuilt. And somehow the Cathedral ultimately prevailed as a place of Christian worship and as a focal point of the city of Rouen.

I hope we can "take heart" this Christmas in such stories of endurance - especially on those days we find ourselves feeling stressed in many different ways. The story of God's salvation in the birth of Jesus is a story that has found continued resonance in the human heart for a very long time. It is a story for which cathedrals and chapels have been built and have stood as sentinels of its proclamation for thousands of years. And it is this longer story that we are a part of - which is reassuring. Our God has chosen to come and live among us. Yes God is with us and love <u>will</u> prevail!

I wish you a blessed and holy Advent and Christmas.

Monetary donations help supply some of the basics such as fresh fruit and vegetables that do not come directly from donations, or the USDA food. CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS

I. Becoming a UCC Covenanted Church

In the Fall of 2022, we were blessed by being able to hire Rev Linda Hey as our interim pastor. She came to us with an abundance of skills, love and dedication to help us move forward as a church and hire a permanent pastor. I can't give justice to the many things she has brought to us including participating in all our ministries, leading the Transitional Steering Committee and most important guiding us in our spiritual and church needs. It is time for us to accept the responsibility of moving forward on results of this work. The Transitional Steering Committee recommends that our church begin a discernment process to obtain standing in the United Church of Christ (UCC). The Church Council made up of church leaders voted to accept this recommendation on October 1, 2024.

What does this mean? What has to happen? Where do I get answers to my questions?

We have had two congregational meetings to answer questions here is a summary of what we learned:

Q: Why join the UCC and What are the benefits?

A: Membership in UCC

Expands our resources as a part of a larger church community Grows our fellowship, sharing information and strategies with more churches Guides us in understanding the changing church/world culture which is difficult if we are "going it alone". There is strength in numbers.

Increases the potential for new members and more opportunities for learning Anchors us, helps us in the search process for a new pastor

Q. What are the benefits of joining the UCC

A: Ability to access wide range of resources available, including but not limited to:

Guidance and resources for our pastoral search Financial guidance and resources for building needs Guidelines for missions and stewardship A chance to hear what other churches are doing A chance to be a part of something larger than ourselves. Support and educational opportunities for our pastor Mediation support for churches and their pastors

Q: What is the financial impact of joining the UCC?

A: There is a Per member per year assessment of approximately \$21 per member. This can be accounted for in a number of different ways and should not be a deterrent. We already pay part of it to the Cumberland Association.

Q: Are we associated with UCC currently?

A: We are associated with the Cumberland Association part of UCC. We are not in full covenant with the UCC. We have been fortunate to use some of their resources but we are not supporting them as full members.

Q: Does joining the UCC mean that we have to adopt their programs like Open and Affirming, One Great Hour of Sharing etc.?

NO! We are a Congregational Church. We make our own decisions and would research and vote on anything like this.

Q: Will our pastoral search benefit if we join the UCC?

A: Absolutely! We will be attractive to a larger pool of candidates, and be provided with guidance to assist in the process of a pastoral search. In addition, our pastor will benefit greatly from our being a member of the UCC in terms of professional development opportunities, resources, guidance and belonging to an association.

Q: What if we join the UCC then decide it is not the right fit?

A: We as a Congregation always have the authority to withdraw from the UCC.

Q: Who will decide if we join the UCC?

A: YOU, the Congregation will assemble to take a formal vote on whether or not to join the UCC. This is the same procedure we use in making any large decisions for the church.

Please consider being part of the committee for discernment.

II. Pastoral Search Committee

Probably the most important action for our church is to form a Pastoral Search Committee. Some of you have probably been a part of this in the past. This is vital to the continuation and growth of our church. Yes, it will involve some time and work. Yes, we are all busy and tired. I feel strongly that God is working with us and will guide us through this process. Please pray about this and look into your heart to consider being a part of this committee. Don't let the nomination process deter you. If you feel you can help our church, just fill out the nomination form to the best of your ability and submit it to Elaine in the office. If you have questions or concerns; feel free to call Fran, Linda, anyone who was on the transitional steering committee or me. Get answers to any questions and consider offering your help. Nominations for the Pastoral Search Committee

October 2024

"The search for a new pastor is one of the most spiritual ministries in the church. The selection of the Search Committee members is to be approached with prayer, wisdom, sensitivity, and awareness that God may be calling certain church members to serve in this particular capacity." (from UCC search and call process)

During the months of October and November, all members of the congregation are invited to consider nominations for the Pastoral Search Committee. There are a number of personal qualities and attributes individuals should have:

A passionate commitment to Christ's church

A positive attitude (no grudges)

A capacity to approach the task with openness rather than a pre-determined agenda

A sense of integrity and respect for others

An ability to be absolutely confidential

A capacity to listen, to participate in a group, and to come to consensus.

An active, supportive member of the church as demonstrated by worship attendance, financial support, and participation

Trusted and respected by the congregation

Willing and able to be present for the meetings and to make this responsibility a very high priority.

All persons who are nominated should be asked in advance by those who wish to nominate them.

The Search Committee will be composed of 5 to 7 members. Two persons from the same family will not be asked to serve. The committee selection will strive for equal representation of gender, age, length of membership, etc. The members on this committee should reflect as much as possible, the diversity of the congregation. All persons serving on the Search Committee should be members of the church.

Once the nomination period is over, an appointed group from the church governing board (Council) will review the nominations and recommend the slate. Not all who are nominated will be selected.
