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MINISTER'S CORNER

Dear Friends,

Thanksgiving Day is just around the corner.

Some would say that there is very little to be thankful for this year. It's hard to argue with that sentiment. 2020 has been a very rough year for most people. We have had to deal with (and are still dealing with) the COVID pandemic, which has infected millions and caused the deaths of almost 250,000 Americans. There are out of control wildfires raging on the West Coast and people in the Southeast are still recovering from five major hurricanes. Financial uncertainty and unemployment have disrupted the lives of many people, Racial, political and economic division is stoking anger and resentment and tearing our nation apart, And on and on I could go.

So, is there anything to be thankful for this year? Are things so terrible that we can't think of anything to give thanks to God for?

There was a little girl who discovered that stretching out her prayers was the only way to get around her parents' demand to "Go to sleep now." She became something of an expert at this by developing an ever-growing list of "Thank-you-God" prayers.

"Thank you, God, for Alice; thank you, God, for Karen; thank you, God, for Ryan." And she was just getting warmed up. She would take a deep breath and run through a list of the adults she encountered at school. "Thank you, God, for our principal, Mr. Baker; thank you, God, for my teacher, Miss Novak; thank you, God, for Mrs. Welch, the school librarian." And on and on.

She also had a catch-all list that included such items as, "Thank you, God, for the cashiers in the supermarket, and the people who put our groceries in bags; thank you, God, for my birthday in eleven weeks and three days.: And of course there was a "Thank you, God, for Mommy and Daddy; and thank you, God, for Alice's and Karen's and Ryan's mommy and daddy.

There were nights, however, when this prayerful little girl was so tired she could hardly keep her eyes open as she climbed into her bed. On those occasions her desire to go to sleep moved her prayers to the opposite extreme. She would dispense with her long list of "Thank-you-Gods" and say, simply, "Thank you, God, for God. Amen."

Maybe that could be our default prayer when the world seems so threatening and we struggle to find things to be grateful for. Along with our usual prayers of appreciation for such things as our family and friends and the fact that we're relatively healthy, we can add this little girl's prayers of gratitude. When anxiety about the coronavirus fills our minds, "Thank you, God, for God." When we worry about our financial security or job security, "Thank you, God, for God." When anger and division cause us to worry about the future of our nation, "Thank you, God, for God." It's an all-encompassing prayer that's in keeping with the Apostle Paul's encouragement to "Rejoice always; pray without ceasing; in everything give thanks, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

And if rejoicing always and giving thanks in everything seem too difficult, I invite you to simply say after me: "Thank you, God, for God!"

GIVING TREE FOR LONG CREEK YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CENTER

Greetings to all of the church family. It has been quite a year for all of us. And it is now that time of year when we search for the right gifts for our families. This year the Giving Tree is not up in the Vestry covered with tags for items to go to the Youth Center. I miss standing up in front of you all to make this ask in person. The tree and the tags may not be here, but we are. In last Sunday's sermon, Rev, Curry mention that we can and should be taking our faith outside of the building we call the church. This is an opportunity to do just that.

We ask that you remember the young people who must spend time at Long Creek, or in the judicial system housing, and are away from their families. Somehow we may understand that bit, "away from their families", much better now. As in past years we are sending them some gifts to let them know that there are people who do care about them and that we want them to succeed and to be well.

This year we are asking you to consider purchasing gift cards. I fully understand the difficulties of shopping for many of us these days. I', right there with you in being as careful as I can be. That's the main reason for asking for the gift cards, so you don't have to go searching in the stores for a list of different items.

Please consider a purchase in the amounts ranging from \$10 to \$25 from any of the following fast food or department stores: Subway, McDonald's, Burger King, Amato's, Target, Wal-Mart, Marshalls, TJ Maxx and Burlington, as well as Hannaford and Shaw's supermarkets. These were business listed by Stephanie Netto of Long Creek as being most useful to the youth. The cards may be purchased at the checkout in any of these stores and many can be found at your favorite grocery store. Please be sure to include on the card or gift receipt the value of the gift card.

If you are not able to shop for cards and wish to make a donation, you may submit a check, made out to LCYDC Benefit Fund with a notation for residents' canteen accounts. This will insure that the monies stay at Long Creek for the canteen accounts for the young people.

Please place the check, or gift card(s) in a sealed envelope, mark it for The Giving Tree 2020, and mail or deliver to the church office by December 14th.
