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PASTOR'S MESSAGE:

"....Maybe Christmas Means a Little Bit More"

Have you noticed how the Christmas season seems to start earlier and earlier every year? I confess (don't tell anybody) that I have been listening to Christmas music in my car since the beginning of November. I'm not sure why this is so... And surely you have noticed how Jesus' birthing event to a poor Jewish couple over 2,000 years ago has turned into a holiday of retail buying traditions that begin even before Thanksgiving. I'm also not sure why this is so...

Nevertheless, there are so many extra things to do at Christmas time, and we don't want to miss out on even a minute of Christmas joy! Yet, we may wonder every so often, as Mr. Grinch once did, " if Maybe Christmas...means a little bit more?" As people of faith, it is helpful for us to take a moment out of this busy season to consider this. A moment to reflect more deeply on the "little bit more" of Mary and Joseph's experience. We love the Nativity. Our Creche scenes of the Holy Family are set up in our houses already. But there is another side to this sweetness of a newborn baby surrounded by animals in a stable. Rarely do we think about how hard it must have been for them, and the fact that soon after Jesus' birth the Holy Family became refugees. Yes, it's true.

Having refugee status is nothing new for our Jewish sisters and brothers. Theirs is a long history of social rejection. They know what it means to be forced to leave their homeland. The refugee life is fraught with danger. While Jesus was still very young, Joseph was told in a dream that he and his new family were to flee to Egypt to protect Jesus' life. So he packed up his family and they went. Mary and Joseph were probably not received very kindly when they arrived in Egypt. We know how people look upon refugees. We see it, and hear it, in our own time, "Who are these people? What do they expect of us? Were they given permission to come here and use our public resources and take jobs away from us? They'd best get help from their own kind. They should go back to where they came from."

If we dare to think about such things as we look upon the Nativity, our innocence gives way to astonishment. Yes, the very idea of incarnation is astonishing! It is powerful and a little crazy.

God's saving love for us has come, not in some secular or supernatural image of power, but into the real world in which you and I live - full of human vulnerability and human cruelty. A world full of war, violence, prejudice, and unequal access to life's opportunities. Yes, God chose to depend upon a poor Jewish (soon to become) refugee family to bring hope and salvation to all the world. That is the crazy part. It was an awesome responsibility for Mary and Joseph. The world did not receive them with open arms and open hearts. There were only a few people there on that holy night - Mary and Joseph and the poor shepherds working in the fields. They were the unlikely witnesses to this event that had the power to change the very heart of humanity. "And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the Inn." (Luke 2:7) It was a not-so-simple birth far from home and far removed from all human hospitality and caring, but it was a birth that changed the world.

So this is the "little bit more" I have for you to ponder this Christmas. And one more thing. If you find yourself feeling like a refugee this year in some way, take heart for God favors you.

I wish you the presence of God's Spirit in these days of Advent and Christmas. May your heart be touched by God's astonishing gift of love.

MUSIC DIRECTOR SEARCH IS UNDERWAY

Bethany Kirkpatrick's last Sunday with us will be February 26. A Search Committee has been formed to advertise, interview and select of new Music Director. The group met on December 18 after church and agreed on the wording of the job announcement and where it would be advertised.

The Search Committee consists of: Susan Fielding (Chair), Wendy Northrup, Rev. Linda Hey, Kate Sawdon, Mary Ellen Bossom, Elaine Sederlund, and a representative (TBD) from Governing & Finance.

Christmas Offering Project Grace Keep Me Warm Fund

The Christmas Offering this year is being dedicated to Project Grace's Keep Me Warm Fund. Project Grace provides emergency heating assistance for residents in Scarborough who own or rent their homes or have children in the Scarborough Public Schools. Fuel includes heating oil, propane, K-1, firewood and utilities for electric heat. **Please look for the Special Christmas Offering Envelopes in the pew racks.**

They also refer applicants to HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program) which assists low income qualified Mainers. However, this application process can take from 6-8 weeks to complete. Project Grace helps to bridge the gap between the time of HEAP application to approval. For example, typically 100 gallons of heating oil or the equivalent of another heat source would be delivered. They have a relationship with local vendors so delivery can be made within 1 -2 days with payment being made directly to the provider.

According to Stephanie Cox at Project Grace: "On average we provide 70 "helps" of fuel assistance during the heating season – it varies from a couple cords of firewood, K1 or propane and 100 gallons to a full tank of oil depending on the circumstances. Many of our callers are on a fixed income or going through a temporary tough patch. Because Maine has some of the oldest, draftiest homes, Project Grace recently held a workshop to help neighbors save fuel and funds. More than 75 people stopped by to pick up samples including weatherizing supplies like window film, outlet gaskets, and weathering tape. Our friendly, knowledgeable volunteers often answer callers' questions when they call for assistance and refer then to other sources of help with their energy and fuel needs."
