#### The Special Easter Offering - to Help Feed the Ukrainian Refugees And Other News from the Ministry of Outreach and Stewardship

This year we discussed how we might help some organization that was going to be helping the Ukrainian refugees. The terrible war has created a huge tide of people fleeing Ukraine. They are going to places like Poland, Hungary, Moldova, and Romania.

This year we chose **World Central Kitchen** to receive our Special Easter Offering. We all can't go to cook and serve meals there, so this offering is in place of our bodily presence. And, this organization is in keeping with our theme of feeding people in need.

Within 24 hours of the initial attacks on February 24<sup>th</sup>, **World Central Kitchen** was serving fresh, hot, meals at a border crossing for refugees arriving on foot. They are now serving meals inside Ukraine and in the bordering countries, Poland, Moldova, Romania, and Hungary. They not only set up their own kitchens, but also partner with restaurants to provide nourishing meals. As the founder of **World Central Kitchen**, Chef José Andrés, says, "We don't just deliver raw ingredients and expect people to fend for themselves. And we don't just dump free food into a disaster zone: we source and hire locally wherever we can." "At times like these, it's easy to feel overwhelmed by the scale of the challenges we face, and the speed of each new crisis. But many complex problems have simple solutions. Sometimes you just need to decide to do something. Sometimes you just have to show up with a sandwich or some warm rice and beans."

To further aid the victims of the aggression in Ukraine and surrounding countries, a donation has been made to Samaritan's Purse, an organization that responds to disasters such as that in the Ukraine. They have sent scores of disaster response specialists to Ukraine, Poland, Romania and Moldova and are operating an Emergency Field Hospital in Ukraine.

To quote Franklin Graham, President of Samaritan's Purse: "God calls us to go into crisis areas to help those most vulnerable. As the conflict in Ukraine escalates, our international disaster team with doctors, nurses and other specialists are equipped and ready to help people in Jesus' name. We want them to know that God loves them
