PASTOR'S MESSAGE:

Wilderness

The forty days of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Lent means many things to many people. It is a time of preparation for Easter, when people of faith engage in spiritual rituals and disciplines - such as fasting, prayer, self-examination, and acts of repentance.

The number forty has symbolic meaning. It is connected to our faith stories - including the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for his ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling. We also remember how Israel wandered in the desert for forty years before they reached the Promised land. This was a time of wilderness preparation for them. Through those years of wandering, they were tempted to give up on God. But God never gave up on them.



Lent begins with a move into the wilderness. And if we want to receive the gifts of this season, we can do just that. We can move into our own wilderness places. We can go to those inner places of our heart and soul where we are stuck or confused or cluttered by past or present deeds or injuries, and clear them away so that we can be touched by God's grace. It is difficult to do and we may not want to go there. Yet we cannot avoid it - for it is what we find when we decide to go inward and look at ourselves deeply and honestly. Wilderness is hard work.

We do well to remember that God goes with us in this work. When we find ourselves feeling alone and exposed, with feelings we'd prefer to not speak - God is there with us. When we meet ourselves head-on in that unsettling inner place - God is there with us.

You may be wondering how this journey of opening your heart and mind to your inner self during Lent can begin? This is where spiritual practice can be useful. Undoubtedly you will find a practice that works for you. It may include setting aside 5 or 10 minutes a day for regular prayer time. It may include reading scripture and focusing on a phrase or word. It may include daily mindful walks, or serving others, or spiritual expression through art and journaling.

Here is a way you might begin. Try sitting in a solitary place for just a few minutes. Breathe deeply. Relax. Identify the thoughts entering your consciousness. Notice your worries. Notice what feels overwhelming or chaotic. Notice what feels out of balance or blocked. Notice what you resist. These are all parts of your inner self that only you know. You can write them down in a private journal if you wish. This can become the map of your inner wilderness journey.

And rather than doing what we usually try to do with such things...which is to eradicate them...try inviting God into them, to heal and transform them. It can be accomplished with a simple practice of a one sentence prayer, such as this (from Psalm 25): "Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths."

My prayers are with you in your Lenten journey – for whatever way it works best for you. I pray it will be a fruitful one, where you experience the refreshment and renewal of God's mercy and grace.

May God's peace be in your heart.

What is Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. It is always exactly 40 days (excluding Sundays) before Easter. Many Christians observe Ash Wednesday with prayers of repentance and fasting. The rubbing of a cross with ashes on a person's forehead or back of the hand, connects with our origin and symbolizes our desire to be penitential and reflective about our actions during this Lenten time of waiting for Christ's resurrection.

This year on Ash Wednesday, which is February 22nd, you are invited to come to the church any time between 12:00 and 2:00 PM to receive ashes from Reverend Linda. We would love to have you join us. All are welcome.



Lenten Devotionals

"We are simultaneously running from empty while running on empty. Jesus might ask us: "Beloved, is empty the worst thing that can happen to you? Is stillness and doing nothing so awful? Perhaps the thing you are running from is the very thing you most need." Enter Lent, which is all about surrender, emptying, and letting go of everything that leads away from the cross. Running from Empty is a daily invitation to embrace the empty places we might prefer to avoid; to breathe deeply, love fully, act justly; and to find Jesus in the stillness and the storm. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Rev. Linda will be holding a series of 1 hour Lenten Devotionals, utilizing the collection of brief daily devotionals for Lent, "Running from Empty." If you want to share in a Lenten practice of reflection and prayer to help refill your spiritual "tank," this may be just what you are looking for.

The meetings will be held at the Annex on the following days: Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2:30 PM; Wednesday March 1, 2:00 PM; Wednesday March 8, 11:00 AM; Wednesday March 15, 2:00 PM; Wednesday March 22, 2:00 PM; Wednesday March 29, 2:00 PM. There is a sign-up sheet in the Vestry. You can also call Rev. Linda or Elaine at the church office to sign-up and have a booklet set aside for you. Donations to cover the cost of the booklets are welcome but not required.
