PASTOR'S MESSAGE:



It was on the eve of All Saints Day, October 31, 1517 when Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the door of the church in Wittenberg Germany, marking the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. His 95 theses was essentially a "protest" document, outlining his charge of offenses made by the papacy - one of the most serious being the sale of indulgences for the forgiveness of sins for admission into heaven. Luther's conscience would not let him continue to accept what he knew was an offense against God and a misuse of religious power and authority for material, worldly gain.

It was dangerous to oppose the papacy in the 16th century. It surely meant you would be branded a heretic and excommunicated. And it also could mean death if the soldiers were able to get their hands on you. The papacy ordered Luther to retract his accusations, but to this he said "Unless I am convinced by proofs from Scripture or by plain and clear reasons and argument, I can not and will not retract, for it is neither safe nor wise to do anything against conscience. Here I stand. I can do no other. God help me. Amen!"

Today I listened to Martin Luther's hymn (c. 1529) "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." It reminded me of the deep admiration I feel for Luther's courageous spirit. Luther quite unintentionally began the Protestant Reformation because of his moral convictions as he understood them as a disciple of Jesus Christ. When he heard the call of God to challenge the corrupt practices of the church, he set out to do just that, putting his personal career and safety second. And it is because of what he started that we are here as the church today.

It is wise for us to take a lesson from history every once in a while, and even more often than that. We sometimes fall into the trap of believing that we are the first ones to ever experience something such as struggle with difficult choices or even a prodding from God to protest against corrupt powers that tear down God's values and harm God's children. But someone has likely already "been there and done that," in another context. We just need to look for it and then learn from it.

I think one of the lessons we learn from Martin Luther, is to never underestimate the power of faith. Some of us might say, "what can I do, I am only one person?" Yet Luther was only one person. He was a monk in the Catholic church who acted on his Christian conscience, and he unexpectedly changed the world. Most of us have certainly had those times when we tried quieting that still small voice inside us, urging us onto something we'd rather not do. Non-action can be the easier path, but it can also make us complicit in the work of sin. God has been calling faithful souls out of such work and giving God's people courageous spirits for a very, very long time. We have met some of them on the pages of history, in the communities where we live, and in the pews of our churches. Thanks be to God!

In this season of Thanksgiving, I think we need moral clarity and courageous spirits more than ever. Given recent national and world events, it seems that our human moral compass is cracked. Is there anything at all we can be thankful for? Well, yes. The list is longer than we might first imagine, and it includes being thankful for the hope we find in the church – in this church which belongs to the tradition of the Reformers. Following in their footsteps, we too can be courageous. We too can stand up for the things that matter to God- even if they are unpopular. Things like love, justice, truth, human dignity, and genuine encounter are the true agents of God's transformation. So let us be courageous in these and give thanks to God in all circumstances this Thanksgiving season. For this is truly God's will for us! (from 1 Thess 5:18)

I am so thankful for you, and I wish you and your loved ones a Blessed and Holy Thanksgiving Holiday!

WHY DO WE NEED THIS COMMITTEE?: The Ministry of Governing & Finance presented a Long Range Plan – Property Update to the Congregation on September 17, 2023. (Copies available at the church office) The Church Council is seeking individuals with particular interest and expertise to investigate, evaluate and report back to the Council on the feasibility of the 3 major property initiatives options that were indentified.

QUALIFICATIONS OF MEMBERS: We seek individuals who care deeply about the future of the church and accessibility of the buildings. A background or expertise in one or more of the following is desired: building construction, accessibility issues, fundraising and financing.

This Committee will determine its meeting schedule. It is expected that much of the work will be individual research: identifying resources and gathering information to compile and share with the church members.

Notes from the Women's Retreat October 7, 2023

There were 16 participants at "Pray All Ways" led by skillful and trained retreat leader, Reverend Cheryl Anderson. We began the morning with coffee and muffins, a brief time to reconnect as we organized ourselves for the day. We were joined by some friends of FCC, Mary Lou Smith, who makes calls to shut-ins for the food pantry home delivery service, and Christina Young, a food pantry volunteer, and Jackie Manasso, a frequent visitor to our Christian Ed offerings.

Pastor Cheryl led us through a few morning hymns to awaken our spirits - she plays guitar- and the Lords Prayer as revised by Parker Palmer. We learned how to welcome the days blessings by standing and opening ourselves to God, receiving and releasing those blessings back to the world.

We had been asked to bring a small object from nature that had meaning to us. These items were then used as a form of meditation What is it? What does it mean to me? What might God be saying to me through it? And how will I use that awareness to give back to the world? We were in small groups to discover these meanings and learned so much about ourselves and each other as we talked.

Before lunch, we were given the task of writing a short grace prayer, called a "collect".

The collect is divided into five parts: invocation, basis for petition, petition, purpose and ending - an example:

Holy One

Giver of all life and knower of all things

Bless us all with wisdom and love, teach us to know your ways

That we may love one another into deeper love for you and the world

In Jesus name, Amen

Lunch was a simple affair, sandwiches and chips and fruit and cookies, lots of time to visit and reflect on the morning! We returned to our prayers after our meal, singing a few hymns, again using our bodies and voices to invite the blessings of the afternoon. We then settled down to write poetry, haiku specifically. This was a challenge to us all but we did it, and so learned that the intentionality of poetry writing is a form of prayer. We must focus on the moment. Here are a few examples of our efforts:

Earth awakens

There will be multiple instrumentalists, 10+ singing members of our church choir, along with 7-10 singing members from their church choir, and readers from each of the churches.

You could help out by ushering, too, and/or helping pick up after the event. We are excited to share this experience with our church congregation and members of the Scarborough Community. It's fulfilling to perform for you, and to hear you sing -- our devoted church members, always appreciative of music offerings -- so this unique music event could be very special for all of us!

A suggested donation of \$10 will be used in part to cover any last minute non-volunteer performers, but, most, if not all of the funds, will be split between the two churches to support whatever good cause is decided by the pastor and the appropriate committee members.

Helping to End Food Security in Maine



Did you know that Maine ranks 9th in the nation and 1st in New England for low food security (hunger) or that one in every five children is food insecure? About 14% of the Maine population lacks access, at times, to enough food for an active healthy life.

As we approach our Thanksgiving Holiday, the Outreach and Stewardship Ministry has chosen the Wayside Food Programs as the recipient of our Thanksgiving Offering. Wayside has been increasing access to nutritious food to our neighbors in Southern Maine since 1986. Wayside's hunger relief efforts include: Community Meals, Mobile Food Pantries and Kids' Healthy Snacks Program. Our Scarborough Food Pantry is one of the recipients of their programs.

Through its food rescue efforts, Wayside diverted 1,000,000 pounds of edible food from the waste stream in 2022. Rescued food was distributed, free of charge, to 70 + partners throughout Southern Maine including food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, and other social service agencies.

In addition, the Outreach and Stewardship Ministry is donating from its mission fund in November to the Preble Street Organization, also a leader in addressing hunger in Maine. Preble Street's Food Security Hub currently serves 26 towns in Southern Maine and prepares hot, nourishing meals each day.

Thank you for giving consideration to assisting in this very important cause.
