## **PASTOR'S MESSAGE:**

#### Once in a Blue Moon

This year, on August 30<sup>th</sup> there was a Super Blue Moon. Did you see it? Astronomers tell us that this is one of the rarest moons we'll ever see. It happens when a second full moon appears in a month, at the same time the moon is closest to Earth on its' elliptical orbit. Because the moon travels around the earth every 29.5 days, the gap in days eventually results in a full moon happening at the beginning and ending of one month. A 13<sup>th</sup> full moon occurs every 2 to 3 years. A Super Blue Moon occurs about every 10 years or so, on average.

The notion of the phrase "Blue Moon" has been around since the 16<sup>th</sup> century. According to folklore, it was said that to call the moon blue was to state an absurdity, for the moon was not actually blue. The phrase evolved through the centuries to take on the meaning of "a long time." Haven't we all, at one time or another, used this expression, "once in a blue moon" to refer to something that rarely happens?

Did you know that this phrase eventually became connected to rare lunar events right here in the state of Maine in the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> century? "Blue Moon" appeared in the Maine Farmer's Almanac as the designation for the 3<sup>rd</sup> full moon in a season with 4 full moons. How about that!



I have always experienced looking up at the night sky as awe inspiring. If it's a clear night and you're in a place without much ambient light, you can see millions of stars in the sky. It is overwhelming to contemplate the vastness of this reality. Of course our moon is always the brightest light in the sky, and it is beautiful. I remember when I was just a little girl, I used to squint my eyes to try and see the American flag the astronauts left on the moon in 1969. Did you do that too? The possibility of this was just as real to me as seeing Santa and his reindeer flying in the sky on Christmas Eve!

Now that I am grown-up, I know that the moon is not quite close enough for me to see that tiny American flag. Too bad. And I also know that the movement of the earth and moon causes the changes we experience as the turning of the seasons. These heavenly "bodies in motion" are in charge - controlling our shifting temperatures, our changing tides, our changing seasons, and the length of daylight hours.

Life as we know it cycles through seasons each and every year, bringing forth harvest, death, rest, renewal, and new life. It is never boring! It is the way God made it to be. It is also

The way God made us to be. I am reminded of Ecclesiastes chapter 3, which speaks of the seasons of life, and how there is a time for everything in God's purpose. *"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: A time to be born, and a time to die; A time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted...* 

God's mystery is present in all things, and our proper place is to stand in awe of its complexity; of its power; and of God's continual impetus to always renew, refresh, and bring forth life. Awe is a proper sentiment as we consider our smallness in relation to the planets and stars. I believe that with God, awe is what we can feel all the time in the presence of this glorious creation, not just "once in a blue moon."

For everything there is indeed a season. And as people of faith, the words from the teacher of Ecclesiastes resonate with us - that God's purposes under heaven will have their time. God, the Creator of the planets, the sun, the Super Blue Moon, and all of life as we know it, is the only One who can see the big picture. We will never fully know God, but we can give thanks and praise for the light of the sun and moon, and for the gift of life we receive, by God's mercy and grace.

John Libby was one of the original colonists in Scarborough arriving to North America in 1637.By 1664 he owned nearly 300 acres of land on the Libby River (west of the intersection of Black Point and Spurwink Roads.) In 1892, Simon Libby gifted the land facing Fogg Road for the present church site. (The church had met in 3 locations prior to this permanent location).

#### NEWS FROM THE MINISTRY OF GOVERNING & FINANCE

#### **FINANCIAL UPDATE ON SEPT 17**

The Ministry of Governing and Finance invites all to a regularly scheduled Financial Update after Church on Sunday, September 17. We will give you the Year-end results for fiscal year 2022-2023; the Year-to-date financial status for fiscal year 2023-2024; and an update on the possible addition connecting the church and Parish Hall. Please join us immediately after the service to hear current information and be able to ask questions. If you miss the Meeting, you can get copies of any information that is distributed by calling the church office.

#### AVAILABILITY OF LIFE SAVING NALOXONE (NARCAN)

#### The Ministry of Governing and Finances has placed a box of Nasal Spray Naloxone (Narcan), and instructions for its use, in the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) cabinet located in the Vestry.

This action was prompted by an experience the congregation had last year when a young couple attended our Sunday service, and the young man was clearly under the influence of drugs. The young man was looking for help, and Dick Grotton was able to connect the young man with Project HOPE through his contacts at Scarborough Police. This led to a conversation within Governing and Finances that in the event of an overdose on FCC grounds, we aren't fully prepared to assist the person overdosing.

A member of Governing and Finances attended an educational session on opioid overdose and Naloxone, hosted by Sweetser's OPTIONS Initiative (Overdose Prevention Through Intensive Outreach, Naloxone, and Safety). The session provided education on overdose symptoms, administering Naloxone (Narcan), and Maine's Good Samaritan Law that protects individuals and organizations from liability when aiding someone experiencing a medical emergency. Each attendee also received two boxes of Nasal Spray Naloxone.

Naloxone is a medication designed to rapidly reverse opioid overdose. It can very quickly restore normal respiration to a person whose breathing has slowed or stopped because of overdosing from heroin, fentanyl, or prescription opioid pain medications. Nasal Spray Naloxone, commonly referred to by its brand name Narcan, is developed to be used by first responders, family members, friends, and community members who are responding to an overdose emergency.
