PASTOR'S MESSAGE:

What a Mess!

As many of you know, over the last several months Dennis and I have been renovating a house in Kennebunk that has not gone too well – it is far beyond schedule and way over budget! Nevertheless, we are finally getting through the initial projects on the inside of the house and have turned our attention to the outside areas that need work. One of those areas is a broken-down shed with a leaky roof. A couple of weeks ago, when we removed the few things we had stored there over the winter, we had a big cleaning project on our hands as mildew and mold had taken hold due to the leaky roof. Some things were just too far gone and needed to be discarded. It was a mess!

Upon further examination, we decided that the shed itself is also too far gone and so we have purchased a new shed to be built and delivered in a few weeks. In the meantime, the old shed will be picked up and hauled away, and we'll have the fun task of clearing debris and preparing the area with crushed stone. I hope our backs hold out!



When the changes to the house and shed are all done, it will be worth it. It will be new life for the property. But we have had to accept the fact that the path has been strewn with many big messes along the way. There's really no other way to get there!

New life by its very nature, is a force of change. And it makes a mess! When you and I find ourselves in the midst of change, it is uncomfortable. We may even become disoriented, for what was previously there may be gone and we don't yet know what new thing will appear. We don't like this discomfort. In fact, our usual response is to try and figure out how to end it as quickly as possible and restore order to our lives.

The Hebrew people encountered numerous experiences of change and disorientation. You know the stories – their Exodus from Egypt out of slavery followed by their wandering in the desert for 40 years. The prophets also tell stories of battles and kingdoms conquered and Israel's exile to Babylon. Have you ever thought about how whole generations actually lived in a state of disorientation? There were a few ways they approached their messy situations. Some turned away from God. Others turned away from their community. And others, as the prophets testify, chose to *"wait for the Lord."* This was not easy, yet they knew that God was doing a new thing with them. The call to *"wait for the Lord"* is a helpful encouragement for us today to remain faithful to God's promises and God's faithfulness to us. This is true for all of our times and circumstances, and it is especially true for us now, as a church in the midst of transition.

Such waiting can be difficult. Anxieties creep in and can even derail us. Sometimes in our hurry to relieve our present discomfort we deny ourselves important life-renewing experiences. We may deny ourselves time to grieve. Or we may deny ourselves time to let go of things we no longer need for the next stage of our journey. We may even deny ourselves the gifts of growth and new life that transition can bring.

As we return from our summer wanderings and begin planning for the Fall, I encourage us to hold the prophets' advice in our hearts to *"wait for the Lord."* Surely God is preparing to unfold a new thing in our church. While we wait, let us not forget that new life doesn't happen without first making a mess! It's okay. There's really no other way to get there.

Tell FRIENDS, COLLEAGUES, and NEIGHBORS and introduce them to our church! Also, a night you don't have to cook!


