# With God

As I write this, our Lenten Devotional study group is coming to the end of our time together. It has been a rich time of sharing our hearts and souls with each other. We have been challenged by some of the topics presented by our source booklet "Bend." And we have grown closer to God and to each other. What a great blessing it is to have practiced this extended spiritual discipline together through the season of Lent, and to talk about our world through the lens of God's Holy Word. In my humble opinion, this is what we should be doing in the church on a regular basis!

Spiritual disciplines and spiritual practices vary widely. They can be a time of sustained prayer, fasting, meditation, Bible study. Some of us find a connection with God through physical exercise and taking long walks outside in God's beautiful creation. My old neighborhood in New Hampshire was a great place for this as it was in a rural setting. And my new neighborhood in Maine is also a great place, as I can take invigorating walks by the ocean.

Walking outside is very different from walking inside at the gym on a treadmill, isn't it? What I mean is, when we're inside, we often plug in the headphones, listen to music, or watch television programs on the big screen while we exercise. It is good for the body, but not the soul. Really...

But when we're outside in God's creation, there is a different kind of music we listen to - the sounds of nature – birds singing in the trees, the steady pounding of waves on the shoreline. There are different sights to see like the sun in the sky and the melting ice dripping into a flowing woodland stream. And the smells are so refreshing - the salt air and the earth defrosting from the cold winter temperatures.



Have you ever dipped your toes into the cold water of a babbling brook in the forest? Have you ever witnessed a tender sprout peeking out of a crack in the hard case of an acorn?

I believe our God, who is the masterful artist and designer of life, invites us into the work of life and wants a relationship with us, which is where our spiritual practice comes in. We need to respond. Isn't this THE greatest wonder in all of creation? How is it that we are loved by God? Why are we considered worthy enough for Jesus to give his life for our salvation? The rhythm of life is a gift of pure grace to us. The gift of salvation is a gift of pure love for us.

As we live into these days of the Easter season, I encourage you to set as a priority, spending quality time with God. Do what works for you. Maybe you will glimpse God in a sprouting acorn, or while on a walk in the woods. Maybe God's whisper will come in the silence of heartfelt prayer, or you will know about one of God's miracles in the eyes your newborn grandchild. Maybe you will hear the voice of God in worship, in a study group with others, or in the singing of a hymn. Whatever it is, do what you can to be with God. By your spiritual practice, you will eventually find God. And you will know the joy that the author of Love wants you to have, each and every day. May God be with you in these Eastertide days.

#### Maundy Thursday Last Supper Service and Service of Tenebrae

Last year we filled all the seats at our Maundy Thursday Last Supper table. Because it was greatly appreciated by those who attended, we will be hosting it again as part of our Holy Week observations. This year's Last Supper Service and Service of Tenebrae will be on Thursday, March 28<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 P.M. The evening begins in the Vestry, where we honor Jesus' last Passover meal by reading scripture (Exodus, Psalms of Praise, and Luke's gospel), singing hymns, and eating a simple meal together. The meal culminates in the sharing of Holy Communion elements.

Our group then proceeds upstairs to the Sanctuary where we participate in a Service of Tenebrae. In this service we extinguish candles and Sanctuary lights as we read the story of Jesus' night of betrayal and arrest. It is a solemn service, different from others we share together, as it is not a time for fellowship, but contemplation and silence. Many who have been a part of Maundy Thursday services attest to the fact that it is a very powerful experience.



We hope you will join us in remembering the holy sacrifice Jesus made for our salvation.



## WHAT'S COOKING AT THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH?

Many folks have asked for the recipe of the delicious breakfast casserole that Vicki Flynn makes each year for the annual Stewardship Brunch. Enjoy!!

### Stewardship Brunch Breakfast Egg Casserole

Serves 12-14 people

#### Ingredients

¾ to 1 pound cooked ham (sausage or bacon)

6-8 slices of bread (thick cut French white works the best)

¼ cup monetary jack cheese (grated)

¼ cup sharp cheddar cheese (grated)

6 eggs

3 cups milk

½ tsp salt

Place bread in a greased 9X13 pan

Layer cheese and meat

Combine egg/milk and pour over top

Cover pan and put in refrigerator overnight

Bake 350 degrees, 35-40 minutes not covered

#### **Other options**

<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup lightly sautéed vegetables of your choice can be substituted for meat. Can use onions, red and green peppers, mushrooms, broccoli, cherry tomatoes.

Serve immediately



#### FROM THE KITCHEN OF FRANCES E. ROSS

Upon moving to Scarborough in the fall of 1959, Fran began attending the First Congregational Church. She was an active member from then until the mid 1980's. She was elected to the following positions during her twenty-five years as a member of this congregation: Secretary-treasurer of the Sunday School, church Treasurer, Deaconess, and Auditor. This recipe was a Ross family favorite.

#### Coke Cake

Mix in a saucepan and bring to a rapid boil:

1 cup Coca Cola

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup margarine

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup vegetable oil

3 Tbsp cocoa

Take off the stove and stir in:

2 cups flour

2 cups sugar

Stir in the following:

1/2 cup sour milk

1 Tsp baking soda

2 eggs, beaten

2 cups of mini marshmallows



Pour into a greased 10"x 14" pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Frost right from the oven.
