### PASTOR'S MESSAGE

# **A Willing Spirit**

September always comes with a sad goodbye to warm summer days as well as a joyous anticipation of what may lie ahead as we return to our regular schedules. This is going to be an important year of church transformation for us, and it holds much promise. Yes, it is time to adjust our outlook towards "imagining what is possible" and risk looking forward in hope for the future. We can do it. While we definitely cherish all that we have been in the past which has made us who we are today, the turning of the calendar to this September has us looking towards whatever it is God has in mind for us. When we do this, trusting in one another and in God, there will undoubtedly be many blessings and gifts of grace ahead.

Why are you a part of this church of Jesus Christ? Maybe you are searching for something more in your spiritual lives — or wondering about what God has to do with you and your living. Maybe there are times when you feel you are just going through the motions and worship and prayer are a low priority for you. Whichever it is...it's all good, for we all experience peaks and valleys in our walk of faith. The good news is that God remains our steadfast companion, no matter what.



Eugene Peterson wrote a translation of the Bible which he entitled <u>The Message</u>. It is a paraphrased translation, which is quite different from translations you are probably more familiar with. What makes it different is that Peterson restates scripture's ideas in his own words. As such, it takes us a step further away from scripture's original wording, which is important to remember when using it. Even so, it can sometimes enlighten us with a new perspective.

As I was thinking about the peaks and valleys of our faith journeys I thought about how Paul once gave advice about offering ourselves as holy, pleasing sacrifices to God, which is found in Romans 12:1-3. Here is Peterson's version of this scripture: "So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life – your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life – and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for God. Don't become so well adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognize what God wants from you, and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you."

We are usually comfortable coming to God in search of something like healing, or strength, or comfort, but isn't it true that we are usually less comfortable with the idea of presenting ourselves to God as an offering? This requires a completely different orientation towards God, doesn't it?

How can you and I ever be a worthy offering to God? How can you and I ever be an offering that is "the best thing we can do for God?" We are not perfect, yet the love of Jesus' sacrifice for us reminds us that we are loved just as we are - flaws and all - maybe a little out of shape - sometimes even distracted from listening to the sermon or prayers in worship.

Paul tells us that we can get the help we need for the peaks and valleys of our faith lives by assuming a new posture before God – that of an offering of a willing spirit. Instead of always asking God to fulfill our wish lists, we give to God our open heart – eager to discern and do God's will instead of ours. We live with a spirit of generosity and focus on God <u>first</u>. We respond to God's call to us in this way: "here I am Lord," instead of "what can you do for me Lord?"

When we bring to God the offering of ourselves, only then do we begin the process of authentic spiritual renewal. As Peterson says, "you'll be changed from the inside out." And did you know that spiritual renewal is actually the very foundation needed for church renewal? It is true. It is just an attitude adjustment away.

As we return from our summer vacations and set our feet firmly on the path of this important year of church transformation, why don't we first lay this good foundation of spiritual renewal to build upon. Won't you join me in offering our willing spirits?

### GREETINGS FROM THE TRANSITIONAL STEERING TEAM!

Our thanks to all who have been taking part in our Congregational Conversations over these last few months. The information we received from our first meeting on Sunday April 28<sup>th</sup> was shared with you in our July Newsletter.

Our 2<sup>nd</sup> Congregational Conversation was held on Sunday May 19<sup>th</sup>. Thirty-four members and friends joined the task of exploring our "church identity." Together we brainstormed facts about our ministries, and asked hard questions about what is working, and what is not working. We will be using the information we compiled to help guide us in planning for our September Congregational gathering, to be held after church on September 15<sup>th</sup>.

The Transitional Steering Team identified the need for our church community to learn more about the UCC denomination which we are members of as a Schedule 2 church. It was our hope to dispel misconceptions and to give our members true and accurate information about the UCC. Consequently, we distributed a booklet "about the UCC" to interested members, and invited Rev. Marisa Laviola, UCC Maine Conference minister to preach and lead a Question and Answer time on Sunday July 14<sup>th</sup>.

Rev. Laviola preached a sermon on "Who and whose we are" inviting us to consider that our identity as people of faith included our belonging to God. To walk with Jesus means we love and welcome all of God's children. This is at the heart of the UCC identity, and it is a value that resonated with many who attended church that day.

The Q and A that followed in the Vestry was well attended by thirty-four members. Those who were there participated fully with many questions. Rev. Laviola graciously met people where they were and answered their questions in an honest and forthright manner. Attendees liked her very much and said they thought she did an excellent job. A report of highlights from the event follows.

We hope to see everyone at our next Congregational Conversation on September 22<sup>nd</sup> after church in the Vestry. Our forward-looking topic for that meeting will be "Who is God calling us to be?"

# Highlights from our Conversation on July 14, 2024 with Rev. Marisa Laviola, UCC Maine Conference Minister

# Here is some of what we learned that we didn't know before -

- 1. The First Congregational Church of Scarborough has been a Schedule 2 member of the UCC for 67 years (when the UCC was formed and we voted not to be a covenanted church of the denomination.)
- 2. We are 1 of only 2 Congregational churches in the State of Maine who have the membership status of Schedule 2 in the UCC Maine Conference (out of over 150 churches).
- 3. We have a relationship with the Cumberland Association of the UCC, attend their meetings, and have voting Delegates from our church represent us as part of the ministry of the Association.
- 4. As members who are not fully covenanted with the denomination, we are not listed as a UCC church on the Maine Conference or UCC National Conference websites, and as such, we would not come up if someone was looking for a UCC church.
- 5. We have received support from the UCC Conference staff in the past as a gift of generosity. This support has been primarily in the area of Search and Call (when we are looking for a settled pastor).
- 6. We have had UCC ordained pastors leading our church for many years.
- 7. As a Schedule 2 church, we are not eligible to receive the conference offerings of "resourcing the local church."

# Here are some of the major topics that came up -

1. <u>UCC</u> as a progressive denomination. Some members had bad past experiences in other UCC churches with the pastor being "liberal." Others spoke of positive experiences as members of UCC churches. Some also expressed concern that the UCC would try to control the church's beliefs and decision-making process. Rev. Laviola spoke of congregations' identities coming from the heart of the people in them. You are who you are. Finding a settled pastor who connects with a church's identity is important. Churches in the UCC are also completely autonomous in relation to the denomination. While the denomination shares beliefs and takes stands on behalf of love and justice in the public forum, the local churches do not have to agree or adopt them. The church remains self-governing and self-determinative.

- 2. The Maine Conference of the UCC is Open and Affirming. The question was "What is "Open and Affirming?" Some members shared that they did not agree with the UCC's definition/process of Open and Affirming, saying that a gentler, quieter acceptance of all people is a better choice than making a statement about it. Others said that their relationships with LGBTQ family members has helped them understand that a church that is not "Open and Affirming" is not one that people who identify as LGBTQ would feel safe attending. Churches in the UCC do not have to be Open and Affirming. In the UCC, the decision about whether or not a church will become Open and Affirming is a process that takes time and needs careful guidance. The Conference provides such professional guidance, if requested, to fully covenanted churches of the denomination. There was a sense that more discussion about the Open and Affirming process in the future would be very helpful.
- 3. There were several questions about the financial cost of joining the UCC. There was some confusion between the terms "donation" and "dues." Who do we pay money to? Where does the money go? Rev. Laviola explained that churches pay "dues" to the Association. That rate is calculated on the number of active members a church has. FCC Scarborough has been paying such dues to the Cumberland Association right along. This stays with the Cumberland Association and does not go to the Maine Conference. The funds needed to support the Conference and National office come from an offering called OCWM (Our Church's Wider Mission). This is a donation churches make to support the ministries that support them. It is not mandated, and the amount is determined by the local church.
- 4. Additional helpful information: The UCC organizational structure is not hierarchical, but covenantal. Covenant is the principle that defines UCC relationships. Jesus Christ is the ultimate head of the church. The local church is the basic unit of the UCC. Individual congregations work together through Associations and Conferences. All of this makes up the UCC in the National setting. The governing body of the UCC is its members, just as it is on the local church level.
- 5. There was more conversation that may not have been represented here, but we hope we have hit on the biggest topics. The discussion is ongoing.



This summer we have lost two of our dear members.

Herbert Hughes passed away on the morning of June 16th at the Gosnell Memorial Hospice House. As many of you know Herb was a long time member of our church. He served on several different church boards and committees through the years. Many have described him as a grace-filled and welcoming member; a person of integrity. He cared deeply about the church and its future. He served most recently as a member of the Transitional Steering Team, and his input was greatly valued by the whole team. We sure do miss him! His final wishes were to have no funeral but only "calling hours" at the funeral home, and I know many of us showed up to honor him and say goodbye.


There will be sandwiches, chips, ice cream and beverages. Weather permitting, we will be outside. Inside if rainy.
