MINISTER'S CORNER

Dear Friends:

I once read a story about two college students, a man and woman, who were just starting college and were attending a student orientation at the university they were attending. During a break they introduced themselves and started chatting and telling each other a little something about themselves. The discussion eventually touched on the subject of religion.

The man was a devout Christian, and the woman was an agnostic who talked condescendingly about the Christian faith. It was obvious that she was more than a little hostile toward Christianity. The young man tried to find out the reason for her hostility. "Is there something in Jesus' teaching that turns you off?" he asked.

"No," the woman answered. "It's nothing like that. The thing I resent most about Christianity is the people who claim to follow it. Too many of them are hypocrites. From what I've seen, most Christians are basically Unchristian." She went on to share some of the not very loving, judgmental, dishonest behavior she had witnessed and experienced firsthand at the hands of "Christian" people.

Sad, isn't it?

Of course, Christianity doesn't have a monopoly on such contrarian behavior. But I think the young woman touched on an aspect of Christian discipleship that is at the heart of our faith and gets to the question of whether or not we are being faithful to Christ. And that is, has it made a difference for the better in the way we live our lives and treat our neighbors? When we have an authentic relationship with Jesus, shouldn't it transform our hearts, our attitudes, and the way we interact with others? I don't think we can say we have truly experienced the love of God in Christ if we aren't living a more caring, sharing, compassionate and loving life.

We all know that many individuals (in particular, teens and young, college-age people) are not attending church or associating themselves with an organized religion like Christianity these days. As I'm sure you realize, our own church has been adversely affected by that reality. For the rapidly growing number of unchurched individuals in the world, the only "contact" with Jesus they may have is through Christians like us who claim to follow him. We are Christ's representatives in the world. How tragic it would be if our behavior and attitudes reflected badly on Jesus and the Christian faith. I pray that we won't ever let that happen.

CREATIVE CHRISTIANITY

The Bible says, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." The sheep man in Indiana did that in a very creative and generous way.

THE WONDERFUL, MYSTERIOUS WAYS OF GOD

The biography of Nathaniel Hawthorne gives an example of how the challenging circumstances of life can produce new growth.

Hawthorne lost his job, a mundane, bureaucratic position at the custom house, through the trickery of politics. His whole world came tumbling down on him. Even so, one night he wrote these words to a friend: "Under God's guidance I shall arrive at something better."

When Hawthorne told his wife about his apparent disaster, she looked at him and said, "Why don't you write a book? You always wanted to write." Her word of encouragement fell on his parched soul like a fresh drop of rain. He had been waiting for that word from her. So he did write a book: his classic, timeless novel *The Scarlet Letter*.

If Nathaniel Hawthorne had remained employed at the custom house, he probably never would have written his remarkable stories that explored the deep places of human sorrow, love and sin. Hawthorne's experience can encourage us to never give up hope in the wonderful, mysterious ways of God, and how God can shine light into even the darkest circumstances.





LET YOUR LIGHT SHINE

In a distant country a cathedral blazed with light, day and night. Its beauty was overwhelming. The joy and brilliance of the music that was played there for the community enchanted all who visited. Yet few people worshiped there.

A violent war broke out and destroyed much of the country, including the beautiful cathedral. As the nation rebuilt, its wise ruler guided the rebuilding of the cathedral. Unknown to the people, she did not restore the lighting system.

At her command, the worship service to dedicate the cathedral was set for midnight on a warm spring night when there would be no moonlight. She ordered each person to bring a small lantern of a certain size and shape, lighted, to the worship service.

On the night of the dedication a strange and wonderful thing happened. At first only a few lights dotted the street outside the cathedral. As worshipers entered the building, they cast small spots of light in the darkness. But as the crowd gathered, the light grew brighter.

As each small lantern was set in the space provided for it by each seat, the cathedral gradually began to glow again. When it was filled with worshipers, the radiance of the hundreds of lanterns was so powerful that the sanctuary glowed the way it had long before.

The ruler said to the people, "The light of your lanterns has restored the beauty and light of this cathedral, just as your faith offers the beautiful light of God's presence for others in the world to see. Without your light this place would be in darkness. Never again will there be any light in this cathedral except the light you bring into it with your presence at worship. That will remind you day by day how important the light of your faith is to God's world."
