MINISTER'S CORNER

Dear Friends:

If I were to ask you, "What is Christmas?" what would your answer be?

For some, Christmas is a gorgeously decorated tree in the living room, a welcoming wreath hanging on the front door, and stockings tacked up over the fireplace in anticipation of Santa's arrival.

For others, Christmas is attending joyful parties with family, friends and coworkers, drinking eggnog, and baking cookies cut in the shape of angels, elves and snowmen and sprinkled with red and green sugar.

For still others, Christmas is trips to stores and retail outlets and searching the Internet for the perfect gift for their loved ones, writing personal greetings on Christmas cards until their wrists ache and mailing them to people they love and care about, and wracking up a pile of debt that will barely be paid off in time to start all over again next Christmas.

And then there are those for whom Christmas is one of the most holy and spirit-filled times of the year—a time to celebrate the coming of a child the likes of whom had never been born before and has never been born since.

An unknown author wrote the following about a memorable experience that had happened:

The scene was crowded, busy, hectic, frantic, pressured. You guessed it: I was in the mall, and not happy about it at all. As I pressed on through the crushing throng of shoppers, I prayed to God that I would never ever again have to make another trip to the mall the week before Christmas.

Our three-year-old daughter Elizabeth was with me, and with the press of people all around us I decided it would be best if I rented one of those mall strollers so I could keep her close by me. I went to the information area and waited to pay my dollar and take a stroller. It was a long wait there, too: crowded, crowded.

As Elizabeth and I waited, more or less patiently, we heard a loud wailing. It went on and on. It was a shrill and panicked cry. We both looked around to see where it was coming from. Eventually my eyes focused on a child who was obviously lost and very frightened. My heart hurt for her. There she was: sobbing, screaming, terrified. The child didn't know where her parents were.

Friendly folks near the youngster bent down to speak to her. She cried all the harder. Someone tried to take her hand, but she fearfully jerked her hand away and cried harder still. One of the mall employees noticed what was going on and paged security. Another employee went to the child, tried to talk with her—got nowhere; tried to take her hand—got nowhere; and then began asking everyone and no one in particular this question: "Whose child is this? Whose child is this?"

Within moments the little girl's father appeared on the scene—just in the nick of time, for the poor child looked like she was about to completely fall apart. And then she recognized her daddy and rushed to him. Dad knelt to scoop his daughter in his arms and gave her a long, reassuring hug and a kiss on the neck. We knew then "whose child this was." Both father and daughter had tears spilling down their cheeks.

In that wild scene at the mall—crowds of people, some interested in this child, others giving quick glances and rushing by, and others with absolutely no idea that anything out of the ordinary was happening—it struck me that the question of Christmas had just been lifted up. "Whose Child is this?" It's the question Mary and Joseph, and the shepherds and Wise Men had to ponder and resolve in their own minds. It's a question we're invited to ponder and come to grips with, as well.

Whose Child is this, born on that first Christmas?

This is the child who transformed all life and will transform our lives if we let Him.

Whose Child is this? This is God's child, God's only begotten Son: the child who lets us know that God cares in a powerful way; the child who reveals to us the things that are really important, things that matter, and things we can trust, now and forever; the child who declares God's wondrous presence, if only we stop long enough and quiet ourselves deeply enough to see and hear that presence.

Whose Child is this? This is our child, the child of our hopes and our dreams, the child of our most glorious imaginings, the child who can bring those things we want so much to this tumultuous world and to our troubled lives. This is the child who brings us peace that passes all human understanding, who leads us to meanings that go far beyond the external trappings of life, who redeems the pains and disappointments of our human existence.

MUSICALLY SPEAKING:



What makes music great?

I've spent my evening researching the greatest Christmas Hymns of all time. Most people who have spent time in church can guess the songs which have appeared on list after list. Silent Night, Joy to the World, he First Nowell, Hark, the Herald Angels' Sing, We Three Kings, What Child is This, It Came Upon a Midnight Clear, O Holy Night, Away in a Manger......and many more.

These lists did not surprise me. But I started to wonder why. Why are these the most loved songs? Because they stood the test of time? Because of beautiful melodies? Because of touching lyrics? Why do we treasure these carols?

To answer this question, we first need to understand the six elements of a song; Melody, Tempo/Rhythm, Harmony, Texture (what instruments or voices are used,) Lyrics, and Genre (for this research our genre was Christmas Carol.) First, lets decide which elements we do not need or can be found within other elements; rhythm can be found in melody so for this conversation we can remove rhythm from the list, and harmony is the use of alternative notes to support the melody, so again, we can remove it from the list for this exercise. Our genre is Christmas Carol and our texture is voice and accompaniment, so again, both can be eliminated. We are left with melody and lyrics.


Even if you do not consider yourself a good singer, I bet you can hum the melody of each of the songs from these lists. Take a moment, right where you are, and hum Silent Night. I'll bet you were able to do that easily. This confirms that melody is a key ingredient for memorable music. Often, we are presented with a "new" hymn on a Sunday morning, but as soon as we hear the tune, we recognize it from another hymn with which we are familiar. The melody instantly helps us sing the new song with understanding.

Which brings us to the second element of music that I believe makes a song memorable; lyrics. Imagine the lyrics of Hark, the Herald Angels Sing when sung to an alternative tune. It would be novel and initially interesting, but would it replace the original version in my heart, probably not.

Music must touch us aesthetically (melody) and emotionally (lyrics.) I hope you take a moment this Advent season to enjoy your favorite music and appreciate both the melody and lyrics. Allow the music to touch both your head and your heart.

It is not too late to join us with your voice and/or your stringed instrument. You don't need a lot of singing experience. Our goal is to have fun with the music!


