We had a wonderful December at the food pantry. Many food donations filled our shelves, while wreaths and decorations warmed our hearts. Customers so appreciate the opportunity to select items left from the Christmas Fair.



Every family received a bag filled with cleaning supplies. We received toys too, as Santa made an early stop—Project G.R.A.C.E. had extra gifts after meeting the needs of many Scarborough children. We were able to help more than a few families have a fun filled Christmas morning for sure.

Our little pantry is so much more than food. As the Bible says, people do not live by bread alone. All the volunteers take that message to heart and do their best to make people feel welcome and cared for.

I like to create recipes for the pantry, especially when we get government foods that are unfamiliar to many: lentils or canned pumpkin or yellow split peas. Or, just to mix it up a little, putting a new spin on the boring old stuff, like peanut butter or oatmeal. It is fun for me to hear back from our customers that tried a new recipe and encourage them to tell me how they use some items. I'm including one of my creations, based on a Thai recipe, for you to try:

EASY-PEASY NUTTY NOODLES (Serves 2)

(You will need a medium-large size sauce pan or frying pan with lid.)

Ingredients:

- 2 1/4 cups water
- 1/2 cup minced onion or 1 Tablespoon dried minced onion
- 4 oz. uncooked egg noodles or other pasta (about 2 cups)
- 1/4 cup peanut butter, creamy or crunchy
- 1/4 cup ketchup or salsa
- 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1 15 oz. can of sliced carrots, drained (optional)

Directions:

Bring water and onion to a boil. Add the egg noodles and cook partially covered for about 10 minutes, or the cook time according to the package directions. Do NOT drain.

Add the remaining ingredients and stir evenly to coat the pasta. Heat through until all is bubbly. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

For several months now, the newsletter for First Congregational Church has not been mailed to your homes. The numbers of newsletters needed for the bulk rate mailing had dropped so we would have to mail those first class. That's expensive. Or is it? The newsletters have been available for pick-up in the narthex and on the church's website.

It is not clear how many people knew that latter fact, that they could get the newsletter that way. The members of the Ministry of Outreach and Stewardship were concerned that the change in the usual way of spreading our information might not be as helpful and productive as might be assumed. After some discussion about whether or not folks were actually getting the information about the church as well as receiving information about special offerings (Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter envelopes are included in the newsletter), the Ministry of Outreach and Stewardship voted to fund the mailing of the church's newsletter for the next year.

The Ministry of Finance has let us know that the funds that would have been used for the bulk rate mailing would be used first, then money from the Ministry of Outreach and Stewardship would be accepted and used to mail newsletters first class. We, on the Ministry, felt it would be a good use of money for outreach to you, family and friends.

Some members and friends, away for the winter, were going to receive the newsletter first class. Some people have expressed interest in receiving the newsletter electronically in their e-mail so you are being offered a choice: E-mail or snail mail (by postal service).

Elaine Sederlund has devised a form for you to use if you wish E-mail delivery. If you do nothing, you will receive the newsletter in the mail, as you used to do.

Finally, you can call the office at **883-2342**. Pastor Gagnon will leave a message on the answering machine by 7:30 a.m. if the service has been cancelled. If the answering machine message hasn’t been changed, it means there will be a service of some kind (although it may be an abbreviated one).
