

Following the trail to Atchison

River Bend Chapter Bus Tour, Saturday, May 31, on the "204th Anniversary of Lewis and Clark"

The tour departs from 7th and Pennsylvania at 8:30 a.m. and returns at 5:00 p.m. Parking is free.

We will travel the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail from Kansas City to Atchison and tour the historic town of Atchison.

Atchison is a key site for Lewis and Clark, who spent July 4, 1804, there. A magnificent pavilion has been constructed on the Missouri River commemorating their stop. In addition, a Kanza Indian Earth Lodge has been built, similar to the lodges seen by Lewis and Clark, all with National Park Service interpretive exhibits.

In addition to Lewis and Clark, Atchison is a historic town featuring the Pony Express, the Mormon Grove campsite, the Smoky Hill Trail, the Butterfield Overland Dispatch, the ATSF Railroad Depot Visitor Center, the Amelia Earhart Home, and the Benedictine Bottoms wetlands, all of which we will see.

The current Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation National President is Karen Seaberg, who is a resident of Atchison and will serve as our guide. As we drive along, we will have readings from the journals, discussion of early Kansas and Missouri history and many views of the Missouri River.

Lunch will be at the Hoof and Horn (formerly the River House), overlooking the river. Cost is \$45, which includes lunch, maps and handouts.

continued from page 1 Anyone willing to pack their panniers, climb in the saddle and aim their bicycle westward will have, in this book, the shared route finding and cartographic skills of the Adventure Cycling Associations Routes and Mapping Department. That is a good thing to have when you head into unfamiliar

territory on a bicycle. Having a route already scouted and mapped can make all the difference in a vacation where you are trying to maximize your travel time, balanced with a little sight seeing.

I found the book very accurate when I traveled part of the trail last year in Missouri from Rocheport heading east. The text is designed as guide for cyclists, but the historic

She had undergone surgery and treatment for lung cancer in 2006, but the cancer was in remission. She died from a sudden attack of 'organizing pneumonia', which is basically lung failure.

Pat was born in Independence, Missouri, and lived in Jackson County most of her life. She married Robert Stickler, a Baptist pastor who passed away in 1991 from a brain tumor. She had four children, seven grandchildren

and seven great-grandchildren.

Her career was as a licensed Nursing Home Administrator in the state of Missouri, winning several awards including Missouri's 'Administrator of the Year'. She married Ross in 2004 and immediately fell in love with our national trails.

They traveled extensively covering most of the National Historic Trails.

Pat served as Vice-President and President of the Trails Head Chapter of the Oregon-California Chapter, was on the Board of Directors of the Missouri River Outfitters Chapter of the Santa Fe Trail Association and attended the board meetings of the River Bend Chapter. She also was the national Membership Chair for the Partnership for the National Trails System.

She loved the Lewis and Clark Trail and the chapter and quickly made countless friends. Pat loved to laugh and found joy in most everything in life and always tried to see the best in everyone. She was a special lady and will be greatly missed.

June 4, 2008, in Jefferson City, the "Lewis and Clark Trailhead Plaza" on the Capitol grounds will be dedicated.

The project is managed by the City of Jefferson City, with donations, commissions, and funds raised by Missouri school children. The centerpiece of the project is a bronze sculpture group including Lewis, Clark, George Drouillard, York, and Seaman.
