



The first Sunday of March is Transfiguration Sunday, a.k.a. Alleluia Sunday. The gospel reading for the day describes how the disciples caught a glimpse of the "transfiguration" or metamorphosis of Jesus. In other words, they saw Jesus momentarily as he really is — shining with divine light and glory.

We celebrate the Transfiguration of our Lord with "Alleluias." Songs of praise and joy, for in the metamorphosis of Jesus we catch a glimpse of the end result of our own journeys of faith. Yet at the end of the service we hide the alleluias in a wooden chest that will sit in front of the altar until Easter. For

six weeks we will not use the word "alleluia" in our worship.

The hidden Alleluias signal that we are entering the season of Lent, a time of serious self-reflection. The hidden Alleluias also point to the image of God within each of us. Lent is a time to focus on the spiritual disciplines that are most helpful in nourishing and nurturing our true-child-of-God-selves. We are called to fast, give and pray. Over the next six weeks we will explore what these practices involve and how we might engage in them more deeply in our own lives.

Fast! While many people think of fasting as giving up a meal or a particular food (e.g. chocolate) for Lent, it might be more spiritually meaningful to fast from screen time or another habit that might be getting in the way of your relationship with God or others. It might be more meaningful to explore what it means to fast from selfishness or holding grudges.

Give! It is traditional during Lent to encourage church members to give, above and beyond their pledge or regular giving. How much? Try \$1 a day for 40 days, or maybe \$10 a day. The Council will be designating this Lenten offering for a special ministry which will be announced on Sunday, March 10.

Pray! Martha Grace Reese writes, "Good prayer habits act like an incubator for our relationship with God. If we pray, if we show up, God has a much better chance of getting through to us. Over time, we know ourselves better ... Prayer changes things within us and for other" (*Unbinding the Gospel*, pp. 149-150).

Join us as we fast, give and pray our way through Lent beginning on Ash Wednesday (March 6) and coming to fulfillment with in the worship services of Holy Week (April 18-20) and Easter (April 21).

What is God up to?

Bishop Elizabeth Eaton addresses the many challenges churches are facing in her recent article in Living Lutheran. Eaton proposes the question, "What is God up to?" in relation to the



decreasing numbers of active members in the 21-century church. The ELCA has a decrease of 70,000 member per year or about 1 synod per year. What do we do with this information?

In general, multiple denominations are experiencing the same kind of decrease in active members, especially of those who are in their 20s and 30s. The decrease in membership brings much anxiety to congregations across the United States in regards to finances, building maintenance, and lack of new membership. These anxieties send us into survival mode, but Eaton shares encouraging words.

Eaton suggests we are asking the wrong question. Our first instinct is, "what can we do?" Eaton challenges us to ask the question, "What is God up to?" Eaton's reflects that the ELCA is living in a time of transition in the Western church so at this point, we are not sure what the future holds.

The good news in all of this is that we may not have a clear vision, but God does. This opens two more questions Eaton asks, "How is the Spirit reshaping the church?" "How will Christ use us as Christ's living body in the world?"

As a congregation, if we desire to invite people to the table at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church, Eaton suggests attention and devotion in worship, prayer, Scripture study, generosity and service. How are we reaching out to those who desire a faith community? To our neighbors who are hungry? God has chosen us as the hands and voices to welcome the stranger to be a part of our community.



Finding a Support System

Aubreigh knew something needed to change.

She was struggling with substance use and alcohol. She couldn't find a way to take care of her mental health. She was unable to provide a safe home for her son, who needed to move in with his dad. When she finally took a step in the right direction and found a home, all her belongings were stolen.

Through LSI's Family Safety, Risk, and Permanency Services, Aubreigh connected with her worker, Kelsy. Together, the duo is working on budgeting Aubreigh's money, finding a good job, and building a safe home environment for her son.

"I was in a bad situation, and I'm really thankful for LSI," she says. "Without them, who knows where I'd be."

Aubreigh now meets with Kelsy once a week and feels like she is finally on the right path after plenty of hard work. She is working with her son and his father to build a healthy co-parenting relationship, and she knows Kelsy will always be in her corner, ready to cheer her on.

"Kelsy has been an awesome resource. She helps if we have issues co-parenting, and we do a lot better now as a family," Aubreigh says. "If I have any problems, Kelsy is there."




