Thoughts from the Psalms

Psalm 138 deals with the subject of worship.

1 I will praise Thee with my whole heart: before the gods will I sing praise unto Thee.

David is so grateful to God for His abundant lovingkindness (see verse 2—I will...praise Thy name for Thy lovingkindness) that such a reaction will flow from his whole heart. It is when God's people

realize His amazing nature (Who He is) and wonderful works (what He has done and promises to do in the future) that praise is genuine.

David also is unashamed to say he will praise his God *before the gods* (the man-made gods which are not worthy of praise for they are not God!).

2 I will worship toward Thy holy temple, and praise Thy name for Thy lovingkindness and for Thy truth: for Thou hast magnified Thy Word above all Thy name.

Notice the use of *Thy* and *Thou* in this verse (*Thy holy temple; Thy name; Thy lovingkindness; Thou has magnified; Thy Word*). All praise belongs to God! The Apostle Paul understood that all believers should do all things for the glory of God: *Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God (I Corinthians 10:31*).

David especially thanks God for the truth that is revealed through His Word: for Thou hast magnified Thy Word above all Thy name (see John 17:17).

3 In the day when I cried Thou answeredst me, and strengthenedst me with strength in my soul.

No doubt David recalled the times when God delivered him from many trials and dangers: battles with the Philistines, opposition from Saul, treachery from his son Absalom, issues with his own people. God answered his prayers!

Notice the phrase *strengthenedst me with strength in my soul*. This is a cognate accusative grammatical expression which might well be translated "Thou didst *surely* strengthen my soul." David understood that the strength he gained came from God and God alone!

4 All the kings of the earth shall praise Thee, O Lord, when they hear the words of Thy mouth.

Perhaps David received the same revelation that God gave to Paul: Wherefore God also hath highly exalted Him, and given Him a name which is above every name: That at the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; And that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father (Philippians 2:9-11).

One day every creature God has created will ascribe all glory to Him!

5 Yea they shall sing in the ways of the Lord; for great is the glory of the Lord.

God's creation reveals His glory (*The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament showeth His handiwork*); and His ways are not our ways, but they are always right (<u>Revelation</u> 15:3).

6 Though the Lord be high, yet hath He respect unto the lowly; but the proud He knoweth afar off.

How amazing is the fact that the very God of the universe, as powerful and holy as He is, cares especially for humble people whom the world generally disregards! Jesus expressed similar thoughts in His sermon on the mount: Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth (Matthew 5:3-5).

In contrast, the proud He knoweth afar off (see Matthew 6:1-7).

7 Though I walk in the midst of trouble, Thou wilt revive me: Thou shalt stretch forth Thine hand against the wrath of mine enemies, and Thy right hand shall save me.

David had great confidence that God would provide victory no matter what obstacles or enemies he would inevitably face!

8 The Lord will perfect that which concerneth me: Thy mercy, O Lord, endureth for ever: forsake not the works of Thine own hands.

David understood that God's nature does not change and that His love is eternal!

May believers today need to trust God in the same way, not becoming overwhelmed by difficult circumstances!
