## **Thoughts on Romans**

1:16 For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek.

There were quite a number of factors in Paul's life that are relevant to what he says in this amazing verse: 1. He was a servant (actually a slave) of Jesus Christ (1:1a); 2. He was commissioned by God

to be an Apostle (1:1b); He had seen the risen Christ and was convinced by the Holy Spirit that Jesus is the risen Savior (1:4); He prayed without ceasing for believers and unbelievers (1:9); And because he had such a burden for all humanity—whether Greeks or "Barbarians" (non-Greek-speaking people) - he was ready to preach the Gospel to the Romans whom he had never met (1:14-15).

Such an awareness of how God had saved and called him caused Paul to be obedient to the commission he had received from Him. That surely led Paul to say he was not ashamed of the Gospel!

He had already experienced the joy of leading many to Christ in cities throughout Arabia, Cyprus, Galatia, and a number of cities in Europe. There was no doubt in his mind that the Gospel of Christ is "the power of God unto salvation to everyone the believeth."

Paul would not change the basic Gospel message for any reason: *I marvel that ye are so soon removed from him that called you into the grace of Christ unto another* ("different") *gospel: Which is not another; but there be some that trouble you, and would pervert the Gospel of Christ. But though we, or an angel from, heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed. As we said before, so say I now again, If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that which ye have received, let him be accursed* (Galatians 1:6-9).

Paul also refused to use worldly methods when he preached the Gospel: Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? So run, that ye might obtain. And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we are incorruptible. I therefore so run, not as uncertainly; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air: But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway (I Corinthians 9:24-27).

Paul was convinced that presenting the Gospel was absolutely necessary. He was also convinced that presenting the Gospel in his way rather than His way was not at all acceptable!

We are living under very different conditions than what Paul faced in the 1<sup>st</sup> century, but the Bible is the Word of God and does not change!

There are two significant problems that the 21<sup>st</sup> century Church faces. 1. So few Christians have ever even attempted to lead a lost soul their Savior! This author has seen statistics that indicate that only 2 or 3 percent of professing Christians have ever presented the message of salvation to anyone else, and about half of that small number gives up quickly because they find that not all are happy when they hear someone tell them about sin, hell, the blood, repentance, and the fact that their religion or "good works" cannot save them! 2. There are far too many preachers and evangelists who seem to be more concerned that they might offend their audience and therefore present messages that ignore man's sinful condition.

People like to hear that they are "ok." God says that man is in desperate need!

The Gospel is the answer!

A charge to keep I have, A God to glorify, A never-ending soul to save, And fit it for the sky.

To serve the present age,

My calling to fulfill; O may it all my pow'rs engage To do my Master's will!
