## Thoughts on Romans

**1:4** And declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead.

The word "declared" is used to describe an important point made in verse 3 about *His Son Jesus Christ our Lord.* The description is from ὀριζω in the Greek. It is interesting that Paul was "separated unto the Gospel of God" in verse 1; the verb there is related to the one here (ἀφοριζω). Thus, God's sovereignty is evident in two cases in this passage: Paul's apostleship and Gospel ministry and Jesus' entire life and ministry were according to God's will. For more on the verb ὀρίζω, see Luke 22:22; Acts 2:23.

Our Lord was the eternal Son of God in His preincarnate state (<u>II Corinthians 8:9</u>; <u>Philippians 2:6</u>) and still so after His incarnation (verse 3, "of the seed of David"), but it was His resurrection from the dead that definitely *marked Jesus off* (the idea of the verb ἀρίζω) as God's Son.

Jesus had been declared to be God's Son at His baptism (<u>Matthew 3:17</u>; <u>Mark 1:11</u>). Further, He had made claims about Himself that He is God (consider all the *I AM* declarations in the Gospels). Finally, He prophesied His resurrection many times!

This event, the resurrection, gave God's seal "with power", "in power", and was declared so in power" (II Corinthians 13:4). The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the miracle of miracles and was a point made in every sermon in the books of Acts!

To put it another way, His resurrection declared Jesus to be Who He truly is!

The phrase "according to the spirit of holiness" does not refer to the Holy Spirit, but rather to Jesus' personal holiness. Jesus was *in all points tempted as we are, yet without sin* (Hebrews 4:15). The noun "holiness" here is ἀγιωσύνη and is rare in Scripture (here; I Thessalonians 3:13; Il Corinthians 7:1; and 3 times in the Septuagint, the Greek translation of the Hebrew Old Testament). Each time it describes the attribute of God.

The phrase "Jesus Christ our Lord" sums up the total personality of our Savior—His deity and His humanity.

**1:5** By Whom we received grace and apostleship, for obedience to the faith among all nations, for His name.

Paul surely recognized that His salvation was a miracle of God that was accomplished "by grace through faith" (Ephesians 2:8-9), and his apostleship was according to a calling from God (1:1). He would not accept any personal glory!

The word "for" is actually a preposition (**ɛis**) in the Greek, which here indicates the marvelous result of God's working in Paul's life. The man who had formerly arrested, harassed, and killed Christians became obedient to God because of the faith given to him by grace.

The phrase "obedience to the faith" is an obedience that was produced by Paul's faith. It began immediately after his miraculous conversion (see <a href="Acts 9:6">Acts 9:6</a>) and continued throughout the remainder of his life on this earth.

It was the combination of Paul's realization of the resurrection and God's grace that caused him to be faithful to his Lord (see II Timothy 4:6-8)!

May we, realizing how good God has been to us, follow the example of the Apostle, serving our Lord in resurrection power!

Our blessed Lord was slain, The Christ Who came to reign, And in the grave He lay, To wait the coming day.

They sorrowed when He died, Nor sought their tears to hide, But soon their bitter pain Was turned to joy again!

The stone was rolled away, For Christ was raised that day; And now He lives above To manifest His love!

He rose triumphantly
In power and majesty!
The Savior rose no more to die;
O let us now proclaim
The glory of His name,
And tell to all He lives today!
