Thoughts on Romans

1:22 Professing themselves to be wise, they became fools.

Having explained the hardness of mankind's heart ("their foolish heart was darkened") in verse 21, the Apostle now declares the foolishness that dominates the thinking of unsaved people ("they became fools").

Man, *naturally* fails to glorify the God Who created him (verse 21) and become arrogant while doing so (verse 22)!

The Psalmist describes man's condition to be just as Paul does: The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God. They are corrupt, they have done abominable works, there is none that doeth good. The Lord looked down from heaven above upon the children of men, to see if there were any that did understand, and seek God. They are all gone aside, they are all together become filthy: there is none that doeth good, no, not one (Psalm 14:1-3).

Jesus emphasized the emptiness of ignoring His offer of salvation: For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul (Matthew 16:26)?

How empty, how arrogant, how foolish unsaved man is!

1:23 And changed the glory of the uncorruptible God into an image made like corruptible man, and to birds, and fourfooted beasts, and creeping things.

Paul here shows indignant contempt for those grotesque efforts to present pictures (idols) of a "deity" that had long since been lost!

Instead of worshipping the God Who has created all things, man decides to worship things of his own creation! In the past man has worshipped the sun, moon, and stars rather than God (<u>Deuteronomy 4:19</u>; <u>II Kings 17:16</u>; <u>21:3,5</u>; <u>II Chronicles 33:3</u>), animals (<u>Exodus 12:12</u>; <u>32:4</u>), pictures on walls (<u>Ezekiel 8:10</u>), and earrings (Genesis 35:4).

God demands that His people avoid idolatry: Turn ye not unto idols, nor make to yourselves molten gods: I am the Lord your God (Leviticus 19:4).

Some today think man's condition is improving because we do not worship the same idols as people in previous days. How irreverent such thinking is! Consider the statues of Romanism; the attitudes people have for political figures, movie stars, and athletes; and the cults that are so prevalent! Can anyone honestly say that making these things our main focus is any better?

<u>1:24</u> Wherefore God also gave them up to uncleanness through the lusts of their own hearts, to dishonor their own bodies between themselves.

God does not ignore man's sin! This verse indicates that at a certain point He condemns man to do disgusting things that affect man's physical conditions ("to dishonor their own bodies"). Today this is seen in alcoholism, drug abuse, sexual deviancy (which is described later in this chapter), abortion, and many other things that result in depression, mental and emotional disorders, even suicide!

At what point does God give up man to such things? Only God knows the answer to such a question! But what we *do* know is that God sent His Son to die for man's sin and will forgive it and save a soul from it when one truly repents and believes in Jesus (<u>Acts 16:31</u>; <u>20:21</u>; <u>Romans 5:20</u>; <u>John 1:12</u>; <u>3:16</u>).

Yes, man's sin is disgusting to God, but His grace is greater than our sin! Praise be to God!
