Thoughts on Romans

1:32 Who knowing the judgment of God, that they which commit such things are worthy of death, not only do the same, but have pleasure in them that do them.

The Apostle had just listed a number of clearly sinful things in 1:29-31: "Being filled with all unrighteusness, fornication, wickedness, covetousness, maliciousness, full of envy, murder, debate, deceit, malignity; whisperers, Backbiters, haters of God, despiteful, proud, boasters, inventors of evil things, disobedient to parents, Without understanding, covenant-breakers, without natural affection, implacable, unmerciful."

Now Paul explains that unsaved men not only do these awful things; they *know* that there is a God Who will judge them! The participle ἐπιγνόντες is very expressive. Men *know from experience* (that is the meaning of the main verb) that their deeds are evil and face serious consequences. The participle here has a preposition connected with it that makes man's experiential awareness **complete!**

In other words, there is no doubt about this eternally important fact.

Another interesting fact about this participle is its adverbial relationship with the phrase "not only do the same." It is concessive and a good translation would be: "Who, although they totally know the judgment of God...do the same things.

God created man in His own image. Part of God's plan in doing so was to give man a *conscience* (an accumulation of knowledge about right and wrong). There is no doubt that man's heart is defiled! There is also no doubt that man's mind is also defiled! The simple fact is that unsaved man is totally depraved!

The word for "judgment" in this verse is based on a word which means "righteous." God is holy and cannot do ANYTHING that is not right. His nature will not allow any such thing. The conclusion, then, is obvious: man's awful sinfulness cannot go unpunished because God's ways are always right, and no creature, not Satan, the angels, animals, or a self-righteous man can legitimately make the case that God has no right to punish sin!

The word "do" in this verse is also in the present tense, indicating that it is a continual practice. Salvation is not a "self-improvement program!" It is a miracle!

Paul then points out that mankind not only mentally and physically and continually sins, "they have pleasure in them that do them."

The verb "have pleasure" is again in the present tense, indicating it is continual. The verb itself is another compound word which basically means "to reach a good opinion together" with evildoers.

In other words, sinners tend to agree with and encourage other sinners to continually do evil things!

The events of recent days are a manifestation of the truth of this verse. Who can now deny that Israel was viciously attacked?

Certainly, Christians do not question the fact that it was awful.

But there are many throughout the world who actually "reach a good opinion together" with the evildoers.

What should we do?

Obviously, we should pray for the peace of Jerusalem. Further, we should lovingly but clearly speak against sin as did the Apostle Paul in his day.

Brethren, we need to pray without ceasing (<u>I Thessalonians 5:17</u>)!
