We have volunteers driving our van, assisting with reading, tutoring maths, helping with the kitchen program, working in the gardens and supporting sports programs to name just a few. A very sincere thank you to all of our wonderful volunteers.

# Paynesville Primary School Maths

We are currently undertaking an upgrade of our maths program. While students are still learning to calculate and solve equations, parents may have noticed that children in classes are spending more time applying maths skills and strategies than they have before. We have extended our maths lessons to include a greater focus on applying the skills and strategies we have learned to problem solving situations. This Friday a number of our staff have been working with Professor Mike Askew and other teachers from Lucknow Primary and Bairnsdale West Primary to further enrich our classroom maths programs.

Parents of students in grades 3 – 6 would now have been working with their child(ren) for a year on the Maths Mate homework program. The first page of the Maths Mate homework is designed to reinforce skills and strategies and then students are challenged to start to apply these. The final two or three questions each week are designed to really stretch children to reason out a possible solution – it is more process orientated than about getting the right answer every week.

Finally this year in maths we have added an extension maths program for students who show strength in this subject area. We have a number of tutors who work with students in small groups or one to one. Our maths tutors are also upskilling their knowledge with Mike Askew to build on the work that is happening in the classrooms.

#### **Gardening day**

On Tuesday we held our first "Gardening Day". This was an idea that came out of a parents and friends meeting last term and it has proved to be very successful. On Tuesday, parents, grandparents, students and staff joined forces to give our gardens a make over.

The trees at the front entrance were trimmed and mulched. The lunch eating area garden was tidied and mulched and the kitchen garden also received a tidy up. The area around the toy library was weeded, the roses pruned and the area mulched. The new gum trees by the sandpit received some love and care and the garden around the MADD building also had a tidy up.

A very big gardening thankyou to every one who volunteered and came along to help out on the day. We will be holding a garden day every term, so if there are any grandparents, mums or dads who missed out on gardening with their child(ren) ...you will have another opportunity.
