About ANZAC Day

This important tradition has now become an opportunity to stop and reflect on the sacrifice and dedication of all our veteran and service community, and the families who support them.

It is a significant day for the department, and we proudly recognise our many staff who have served over the years.

ANZAC Day is a public holiday. School staff and students who wish to observe the day can join in commemorative activities at the Paynesville RSL. These activities include the:

- dawn service
- commemoration march

Grade 3/4 Classroom Report

Grade 3 / 4 have launched themselves back into their learning by comparing persuasive and narrative texts to identify what features make a good persuasive piece. Next, they worked together to brainstorm ideas and arguments for their own persuasive pieces by doing mock debates.



During maths, students revised different addition strategies they learnt last term and began applying these skills to multiplication.

Welcome back to school 4/5 families! Our classroom has started Term Two with a bang! We started with cross country - where we cheered on friends through practises and the main event. During maths we have started with refreshing our knowledge of ordering and writing numbers. We will be moving into factors and measurement in the next couple of weeks so the students have completed pre-testing on Essential Maths.

Reading is very exciting because we are launching our Book Clubs this week! Students will read the same book together in groups and meet once a week to discuss their findings. We will be closely using the Instructional Model during this time and we can't wait to hear the amazing thinking students are doing!

In Writing we are focusing on persuasive writing - this week looking at writing from different points of view, such as; as a seal seeing rubbish in our oceans.

In our Investigations this week we are looking at the significance of ANZAC day and why we celebrate it every year.

Congratulations to our classroom leaders for Term Two - as voted by their classmates. These students will be organising a variety of different activities for their classmates to participate in.




Grade 6 Classroom Report

looked at the link between multiplication and division.


It was fantastic to see all of the Grade 6 students participate in our Cross Country last week. They all finished the course and set the standard for a fantastic day!

Building a national picture of child health

From May 2024, our school, along with thousands of others across the country, will participate in the Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

The AEDC is a teacher-completed census (similar to a questionnaire) which provides a comprehensive picture of how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school.

The AEDC is an Australian Government Initiative and is completed nationally every three years.

Children don't miss any class time while the AEDC is completed, and parents/carers don't need to supply schools with any new information.

The data collected through the AEDC is used by schools, communities and governments to better understand children and families' needs, and identify the services, resources and support they need. AEDC data is reported at a school, community, state/territory and national level. AEDC results for individual children are not reported and the AEDC is not used as an individual diagnostic tool.

Some teachers have found that completing the AEDC made them more aware of the needs of individual children and their class, and that the data was useful for planning for transitions to Year 1 and developing programs.

Participation in the AEDC is voluntary, however the AEDC relies on all schools with children in their first year of fulltime school participating in the collection. Parents/carers don't need to take any action unless they choose not to include their children in the census.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY


New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.
