INFANT BAPTISM: RESPONSE 1

It was so encouraging to read a response to my article, "Infant Baptism," which ran a couple of weeks ago. I have always advanced the notion that a civil, sincere conversation about religious differences can be most productive. I believe that our discussion will produce much good and a better understanding of God's Word.

Considering his lengthy response, I cannot possibly do justice to a thorough rejoinder in my short 400-word article. Nevertheless, I will respond to our differences in multiple articles. I encourage you to retain

my article and his response as a reference for this dialogue.

I appreciate Mr. Kalbas' forthright admission that there exists no "explicit command to baptize children or babies" (or example or implication, either). However, the Bible does teach that we should baptize every creature (so, by implication, this includes women) who understands the Gospel (which does not include babies, cf. Mark 16:15). Faith, on shifting sand, is destined for a "great fall" (Matthew 7:24-27). What is Mr. Kalbas' foundational flaw? He believes that all human beings are born depraved. Hell-bound and children of their father, Satan. But wait, what does the Scripture say? Quite simply, the Bible says sin is a transgression of the law (lawlessness, 1 John 3:4). What is interesting about this verse is he instigating feature of sin: commission. When John says, "Whoever commits sin also commits lawlessness," he is describing how sin manifests its existence.
