In The Origin of Brands, authors Al & Laura Ries point out one of the primary purposes and importances of "branding": to "divide and conquer." The idea of having a brand is to promote the preference and superiority of one certain product above another. Of course, this marketing tactic is more involved than the simplicity of ranchers putting brands on cattle to differentiate between one's own stock and his neighbor's. Nevertheless. over the course of time, the reputation of one brand could represent a certain quality of livestock, rendering it more desirable. There is no question about this fact, though: concerning cows, the brand is intended to divide one cow from another.

It has always been puzzling to me how such common sense principles. used every day by nearly every human on the planet, totally escapes religious application amongst those who feign a desire for unity but still insist on using "brands." "Now I say this, that each of you says, 'I am of Paul,' or 'I am of Apollos,' or 'I am of Cephas," or 'I am of Christ.' Is Christ

divided?" (1 Corinthians 1:12-13a).

Now there's a rhetorical question. Well, friends? Is Christ divided? If not, why do religionists cling so tenaciously, defend so vociferously and, frankly, chafe with such discomfort when someone introduces the obvious. In fact, such a point is so obvious that the only retort most can muster is anger, since common sense makes the point "ungetoverable"! "Have I therefore become your enemy because I tell you the truth?" (Galatians 4:16). For some folks, I guess the answer is a resounding "YES!" So... whv?

We know "brands" are intended to divide and yet, religiously, so many mistaken and misguided souls, instead of giving up these divisive denominators, are encouraged to give their group names a group hug. Yet, the Bible would resolve at least this one glaring flaw in those claiming to seek the unity of which Christ prayed concerning those who sincerely

seek God (cf. John 17:20-21): call yourself a Christian.
