THOUGHTS ALONG THE WAY...

Philippians 1.21-24 (The Message)

Alive, I'm Christ's messenger; dead, I'm his bounty. Life versus even more life! I can't lose. As long as I'm alive in this body, there is good work for me to do. If I had to choose right now, I hardly know which I'd choose. Hard choice! The desire to break camp here and be with Christ is powerful. Some days I can think of nothing better. But most days, because of what you are going through, I am sure that it's better for me to stick it out here.

There is a longing in us. Blaise Pascal said it comes from the "God-shaped hole" in every human soul. C.S. Lewis and Frederick Buechner have written about it as a longing for home, the hunger within us that draws us toward eternity. I think we've all felt it, some more often and more consistently than others.

In Longing for Home: Reflections at Midlife Frederick Buechner writes, "The word longing comes from the same root as the word long in the sense of length in either time or space and also the word belong, so that in its full richness to long suggests to yearn for a long time for something that is a long way off and something that we feel we belong to and that belongs to us. The longing for home is so universal a form of longing that there is even a special word for it, which is of course homesickness."

Sometimes our longing, our yearning for that undefined somewhere else lingers with us for hours or days or years. And sometimes it ambushes us when we're going about our quotidian business. I have had moments when I was feeling perfectly content and "at home" in my own little world, when suddenly the transcendently beautiful strains of *The Lark Ascending* by Ralph Vaughn Williams will awaken in me pangs of yearning for my true home, for that place where there is peace and reunion and wholeness and nothing is swallowed by the relentless appetite of time.

Plato believed that eros, the love rooted in physical attraction, is an expression of this longing for eternity; he called eros the highest form of love because it was the most immediate and passionate expression of the longing we all feel. His reasoning went like this. You are attracted to a person. But then you learn that what you're really attracted to is beauty. So you pursue beauty. In that pursuit, you learn that what you're really attracted to is truth. As you pursue truth you learn that what you're really

attracted to is the eternal ideal or heaven. So when that fetching someone across the room puts a little spring in your step and sparkle in your smile, what you're really drawn to, according to Plato, is beauty, truth and the eternal ideal or Paradise. Maybe. I've heard worse arguments. And at least Plato gets us to the right place in the end, which is a pretty good trick considering that carnal attraction is his starting point.

This yearning for where we are not and who we are not expresses itself differently in each of our lives. For some it is so unbearable that they try to quiet it with self-medication. Some experience it as a personal imperfection and will starve themselves to death or surgically alter themselves in an attempt to find their ideal self image. Others feel the hunger of the spirit as a hunger of the body and ruin their health feeding an emptiness that can never be filled by mere food. Some, sensing rightly that the yearning is really a hunger of the spirit, move from religion to religion, church to church, denomination to denomination looking for the place, the worship experience, the religious culture, the indefinable something that feels more like home. But even the most moving worship experience, the most profound religious en counter, the most comfortable culture or community give us only glimpses of the real thing. They point to it and reinvigorate our yearning for it, but they are not the thing itself, not the eternal home for which we are destined.

Philippians 3.20-21 (The Message)

But there's far more to life for us. We're citizens of high heaven! We're waiting the arrival of the Savior, the Master, Jesus Christ, who will transform our earthy bodies into glorious bodies like his own. He'll make us beautiful and whole with the same powerful skill by which he is putting everything as it should be, under and around him.

We are meant to feel not entirely at home in this world, I think. It is built into us to yearn for the presence of Christ which we won't experience most fully until we come to our eternal home. It is built into us to keep looking for the experience, the place, and the people that speak most fully to our hearts. But it's also important that in that yearning and searching we don't overlook the gifts that God has put right in front of us, the people with whom God has surrounded us who reflect Christ to us in our life together. Maybe we see "dimly through a glass," but even in the dimmest light, Christ is in our midst.
