A friend of mine posted a meme on Facebook the other day that said, "What's everyone wearing to the one year anniversary of 14 days to flatten the curve? Asking for a friend." It made me chuckle. At first. And then not so much. Remember when that was what we were thinking? Fourteen days in quarantine. To flatten the curve. Three or four weeks, tops. We'll be back in church for Easter. That's what we were hoping at the time.

A year ago, as we began our journey into Lent, I don't think anyone imagined that Lent would last so long. Through Easter. Through Pentecost. Through Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, and back around to Lent again. This is the longest Lent any of us have ever known.

Fourteen days to flatten the curve. A month at most. It might have worked if everyone had gone along with the program. If everyone had worn masks. If everyone had taken the virus seriously. If everyone, literally everyone, had stayed home for two or three weeks. But people are suspicious and rebellious and ...

All the Monday-morning quarterbacking in the world won't change what has happened. Blaming and finger-pointing won't turn a single day of this long Lent into Easter for the five hundred thousand who have died. Five hundred thousand.

Here we are a year later, praying that the new vaccines will work as advertised and that enough people actually get vaccinated so that we can go grocery shopping with a little less anxiety, so that we can maybe meet each other for lunch and dine inside instead of out in the cold, so that we can cautiously begin to find our way back to being together again. So that we can worship in each other's company. So that maybe, even, we could share a hug. In the meantime, it is Lent again. Still.

Maybe this year we really will take time to reflect. Things seem to be quieter now, inside and out. Maybe this year we will hear God more clearly as we walk with Jesus toward the cross. There don't seem to be as many smokescreens now. Maybe this year we will see the stark reality of the cross more distinctly.

The 45th Anniversary Year of Women's Ordination Research

In the past when the ELCA highlighted the anniversary of the ordination of women, data was collected by the ELCA Research and Evaluation. This data was used to do intentional analysis of the experiences of rostered women in the ELCA, providing material for conversations around the experienced of rostered women in our church. The most recent collection of data took place last year during the 45th anniversary year of women's ordination. The analysis of this new data/report is presented on the ELCA website.

Once again the hope is that this data will be used in conversations across the church. A first conversation took place in August, 2016, at a Grace Gathering workshop led by the Rev. Elise Brown and the Rev. Gwen King.

As we give thanks to God for all the women who accepted the call from God to serve over these past 45 years, we hope and pray that the conversations to come will help us as individuals, as congregations, as institutions, and as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to continue the development of goals that foster equality and health ministry opportunities.

Our past president and dedicated member, Barbara White's graveside service was very special. We were blessed with beautiful weather, and Pastor Steve gave a loving eulogy.


Pastor Steve, Sandy Nelson and I will soon be attending the local synod conference via Zoom. We will keep you posted on any new information we learn.

Thinking about giving up something for Lent? That's one traditional way of observing this season of reflection. There are, however, some other ways to observe Lent. Jesus said that the greatest commandment is to love God with all our heart, mind, soul and strength, and to love our neighbor as our self. Lent is a good time—40 days—to focus on how we are loving God! Spend 40 days reading one of the Gospels. Think carefully about each episode and encounter in the life of Jesus. Think about what that episode tells you about what it means to follow Jesus.

Love God—

Try to find 5 ways every day that you see God at work in the world around you. See how often you can see God's fingerprints on "secular" or every-day things

Practice the Lectio Divina

Read a brief section of Scripture

Read it again and this time see if a particular word or phrase grabs your attention

- Meditate on that word or phrase for a few minutes
- Read the entire section again and see if you understand it differently

Make your first prayer of the morning, "God, what do you want today? What can I do for you?

Love your neighbor—

Practice blessing those around you.

Pray positively for someone you don't particularly like.

Commit random acts of kindness. When possible do so anonymously. **Smile** at a stranger

Love yourself—

Body—40 days is a good amount of time to make healthy changes and develop new habits.

National Recognition of COVID Deaths

By the light of 500 candles as "Amazing Grace" played outside the White House, in a minute of reflection on the 500,000 American lives lost to the coronavirus. Moments earlier, the president noted that the U.S. death toll from the pandemic has exceeded both world wars and the Vietnam War combined.

Although it was not reflected in the solemn sundown ceremony, it also brought good news on the coronavirus front. The pace of vaccinations is accelerating, deaths and new infections are sharply down, and worries about just how bad the pandemic can get are being replaced with halting questions about when all this will be behind us.

But between the somber bookends, officials provided some of the most unreservedly good news the nation had received in nearly a year of pandemic-induced isolation. The seven-day average number of cases is down 75 percent from the peak on January 11, the coronavirus task force reported. The daily hospital admission rate dropped 60 percent since its peak on January 9. Deaths have dropped nearly 39 percent.

From the beginning, President Biden and his administration have sought to temper expectations. On the first full day of his presidency, Biden warned that the pandemic would get worse before it got better, adding that a wartime footing was needed to defeat the virus. Although the federal government has secured enough vaccine to inoculate every American by July, Biden has said it could be Christmas before things begin to feel like normal. Dr. Fauci has warned that Americans could still be wearing masks in 2022. While tempering expectations can be a political reflex, the events of the past few days also show how easy the positive trend can be reversed.

The pandemic has cost more American lives than several wars the country has fought, Biden said on February 22. And its infectious nature added a particularly painful side effect, he added: It has stopped Americans from engaging in the common rituals of mourning that honor the dead and help survivors share their sorrow. "That's what has been so cruel," said Biden, who has suffered his own share of personal tragedy and put compassion at the heart of his political identity. "So many of the rituals that help us cope, that help us honor those we love, haven't been available to us." He said he hoped Monday's moment would give at least a semblance of solace. "We have to resist becoming numb to the sorrow," Biden said. "We have to resist seeing each life as a statistic or a blurb on the news."

Health and Wellness


