WELCOME NEW MEMBER—DEBI NAHIGYAN

How did Debi, a Connecticut native, who's worked in every continent in the world (except Africa) wind up finding joy in our "Little Church With A Big Heart" in Naples? "I fell in love with the church," she said, adding, "Pastor Steve's Sunday messages struck a cord with me." When she first moved to Long Beach she visited different churches and after attending a service at Gloria Dei, decided it was a good fit.

Born, raised and educated in Connecticut, and one of four children, she had a double major in Biology and Education at the University of Connecticut. Following graduation, she took a job in Boston followed by another job in New York City. But this was just the beginning of a career that took her all over the world. Somewhere along the way she did postgraduate work and received her MBA. "I found that your chances of employment are more favorable if you are willing to relocate. Companies like that," she said. "I made a good living because I was willing to take international jobs." "The pharmaceutical industry was very good to me," she said and it was the venue where she met her future husband, Peter. She met him before she got a promotion to relocate to Dallas, Texas, and Peter decided he would move with her and proposed. Her job promotions led them to Irvine, California where she worked for Allergan and he worked for GlaxoSmithKline. Another promotion took them back to Boston in 1992.

They lived an idyllic life with their three children until tragedy struck when 34-year-old Peter was diagnosed with glioblastoma, an aggressive type of cancer that can occur in the brain or spinal cord. Peter died in less than a year after his diagnosis. She was devastated. "He wasn't just my husband, but also my best friend and fulfilled me in every way," she recalled. You can still hear the pain in her voice when she recalls that tragic time in her life. "I was 34 with three small children and did-n't know how I was going to raise them alone," she said, adding "we had a very comfortable life-style and I wanted to maintain that for my family." The only way she could do that was to work a very demanding job that required her to be gone from home for periods of time in all parts of the world. Pharmaceuticals took her to Asia, Europe, South America, and Australia. She changed that scenario when she turned down another promotion that would entail her moving to London. "I decided to take my severance pay instead and I came to Long Beach to be near my children." Her two sons are married now and her daughter lives in Honolulu. Debi is a grandmother of three lit-tle girls and is proud of her children. "They all finished college and are really good people," she said.

She has been living down the street from the church for the last six months with her two Maine Coon cats, Charlie and Elliot. She said that while Charlie is an affectionate and considerate cat, Elliot is a problem child and chooses to wake her up at 2:30 or 3:00 a.m. This is a hardship because she has a very hectic daily schedule that starts at around 4:30 a.m. She is now working for the Long Beach Rescue Mission "Lydia House" for the past hour years. The 50-bed Lydia House provides solace and hope in the face of abuse, addiction, financial hardship and abandonment. "Many of the women and children there are victims of domestic abuse," she said. "After I left my job, I felt that I wanted to give back somehow, " she said, so she started out as a volunteer in the kitchen at the rescue mission. In a very short period of time she was told that she was hired as the coordinator, teaching the residents useful life skills.

What could possibly be left on Debi's "bucket list?" "I would really love to be an apprentice to a chaplain and work with hospice patients, their parents and in-laws, before death" she replied quickly and without hesitation. "Family, faith and education is my mantra," she said.

A MISSION PARTNER REQUEST

If you are considering a tax-free donation, as 2021 comes to an end, please consider making a donation to LSS, a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization, to help with these urgent needs:

- **Parking Lot** The parking lot is in terrible condition; it has not been repaved in 36 years. The potholes and deep fissures in the parking lot make it dangerous for people coming for assistance, especially those in wheelchairs. LSS also uses the parking lot for many outreach activities and needs to make sure the area is safe. The cost to repave and repair the parking lot: \$11,000.
- **Mold** The building they occupy is very old. The floors throughout the building have developed mold. An epoxy sealer on the floors is needed to contain the mold and keep it from spreading. The mold is also a health hazard for the workers, the volunteers, and the people they serve. The cost for the epoxy sealer: \$8,000.
- Heating and Air Conditioning for the Food Pantry There is no heating or air conditioning in the food pantry area making conditions difficult for the volunteers and workers as they distribute food throughout the year. In order to add heating and/or air conditioning, the electrical panel needs to be upgraded. LSS is in the process of obtaining bids to make the necessary upgrades. The cost: TBD.
