THOUGHTS ALONG THE WAY...

It's hard to believe that we've already come around to Lent again. It sometimes feels like we've been doing Lent for all of the last two years. Lent is a time of reflection and metanoia, a time to think about who we are and how we are doing life. For those of us in the church, it's also a time to reflect on how we're doing church. How are we encouraging spiritual growth—both our own growth individually and our spiritual depth as a community?

Martin Luther said, "This life therefore is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness, not health, but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished, but it is going on, this is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified." That's part of the goal of Lent—to take time to polish all that does not yet aleam.

We are not yet what we shall be. In 1 John 3:2 we read, "Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is." We are God's children now, but that doesn't mean God is done transforming us. That's what being a Christian, a follower of Jesus is all about. Through Christ, God is transforming the world by transforming us.

Richard Rohr has called Jesus the transformative icon of God. Jesus shows us what God is like so we can discard all our inaccurate mental images that are usually more like Zeus or Santa Claus than they ever were a picture of who God really is. From Jesus we learn that God is humble. From Jesus we learn that God will go to any lengths to show us how much we are loved.

This is a season to look toward and look at the cross. When we look toward the cross we can see the path of transformation. When we look at the cross, we see just how much it can cost to be transformed

into the likeness of Christ. Jesus serves as the icon of God, holding up a mirror for us as we seek to follow Jesus more closely and become more like him, to "put on the Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 13:14).

Richard Rohr tells us that Jesus serves as the transformative icon of God in order to teach us to deal with our own sins and the sins of others with compassion instead of mere judgment. Judgment is easy. Compassion not so much sometimes. If you don't take care of your own anxieties and unfinished business, you're going to end up spilling them all over everyone else. The cross shows us what happens in a world where everyone is looking for a scape-goat. Jesus' wounded body is an icon for what we are all doing to one another, to ourselves, and to the world. Jesus' resurrected body is an icon of God's response to all of our crucifixions.

During this season of reflection, I invite you to spend some time daily in prayer and reflection. Take time to look inside your life, your heart to see what work needs to be done. "Your vision," said Jung, will become clear only when you can look into your own heart. Who looks outside, dreams; who looks inside, awakes."

May this be a season of awakening for us all.



GOD'S NAME — Becky Crow

There was a moment when Moses had asked God what his name is. God was gracious enough to answer, and the name he gave is recorded in the original Hebrew as YHWH.

Over time we've arbitrarily added an "a" and an "e" in there to get YaHWeH, presumably because we have a preference for vowels. But scholars and rabbis have noted that the letters YHWH represent breathing sounds, or aspirated consonants. When pronounced without intervening vowels, it actually sounds like breathing. YH (inhale): WH (exhale).

So a baby's first cry, his first breath, speaks the name of God. A deep sigh calls God's name – or a groan or gasp that is too heavy for mere words. Even an atheist would speak God's name unaware that their very breathe is giving constant acknowledgment to God. Likewise, a person leaves this earth with their last breath, when God's name is no longer filling their lungs.

So when I can't utter anything else, is my cry calling out God's name? Being alive means I speak God's name constantly. Is it heard the loudest when I'm the quietest?

In sadness, we breathe heavy sighs. In joy, our lungs feel almost like they will burst. In fear we hold our breath and have to be told to breathe slowly to help us calm down. When we're about to do something hard, we take a deep breath to find our courage. When I think about it, breathing is giving God praise. Even in the hardest moments!

This is so beautiful and fills me with emotion every time I grasp the thought. God chose to give himself a name that we can't help but speak every moment we're alive. All of us, always, everywhere. Waking, sleeping, breathing, with the name of God on our lips. *~Psalms 150:6*

WE'RE ASKING THE QUESTION AGAIN...Thinking about giving up something for Lent? Consider some other ways to observe Lent. Jesus said that the greatest commandment is to love God with all our heart, mind, soul and strength, and to love our neighbor as our self.

Spend 40 days reading one of the Gospels. Think carefully about each episode and encounter in the life of Jesus. Think about what that episode tells you about what it means to follow Jesus.

Love God—

- **Try** to find 5 ways every day that you see God at work in the world around you. See how often you can see God's fingerprints on "secular" or everyday things.
- Practice the Lectio Divina
 - Read a brief section of Scripture, Read it again and this time see if a particular word or phrase grabs your attention,
 - Meditate on that word or phrase for a few Minutes,
 - Read the entire section again and see if you understand it differently.
- **Make** your first prayer of the morning, "God, what do you want today? What can I do for you?

Love your neighbor—

Practice blessing those around you.
Pray positively for someone you don't particularly like.

Commit random acts of kindness. When possible do so anonymously. Smile at a stranger!

Love yourself—

Body—40 days is a good amount of time to make healthy changes and develop new habits.

Lent is a good time—40 days to focus on how we are loving God!




