THOUGHTS ALONG THE WAY...

I was reading through the Book of Genesis, as one does, when a repeated phrase in chapter 5 made me pause. The phrase was "all the days of" as in "Thus all the days of Seth were nine hundred twelve years." As I noted, the phrase gets repeated: "all the days of Enosh;" "all the days of Kenan," and so on. Adam, Seth, Enosh, Kenan, Mahalalel, Jared, Enoch, Methuselah, Lamech—each of them was given lots and lots of days, according to Genesis 5, but after telling us how many years of days they lived, each account ends with a stark "and he died." Well, except for Enoch, but he was a special case.

Apparently God thought this kind of longevity was excessive. Right out of the chute in chapter 6 we read, "Then the Lord said, "My spirit shall not abide in mortals forever, for they are flesh; their days shall be one hundred twenty years." It looks like that was meant to be an upper limit and not a prescription for everybody because almost nobody actually gets that old. The longest verified human lifespan in recent times is that of Jeanne Louise Calment of France (1875–1997). Genesis would say the days of Jeanne Louise were one hundred twenty-two years and 164 days; and she died. So she got a couple of bonus years on top of the 120. Good for her.

In Psalm 90 that upper limit gets a few more years lopped off. "The days of our life are seventy years, perhaps 80 if we are strong," we read in verse 10. Tradition says that Psalm 90 was written by Moses. If so, then Moses was in a pretty dark mood that day. It's not a happy Psalm, Psalm 90, and the curtailed life span is the least of its gloominess. Oy.

The point of all this is that our days on this earth are numbered. Frankly, I'm okay with that, even though I'm indisputably closer to the end than to the beginning. C'est la vie, as Jeanne Louise would say if she were still here. I'm okay with going on to what comes next, especially since I'm pretty sure that time will be experienced in a very different way—if we experience it at all. It's all in God's hands, so it's all good.

Here's what's not good and what I'm not okay with: if we don't clean up our act, then life on earth, at least life as we know it, is in real trouble. If we don't make some major changes starting yesterday, then our days as a species are numbered...and we'll take a lot of other species with US.

GLORIOUS DEI...

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Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

I'm Bishop Brenda Bos of the Southwest California Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in American and I want to wish you a blessed Easter. A painting was created for me by Pastor Dawn Wilder for my installation. It's actually Ruth and Naomi, I'm reminded of the women who discovered the empty tomb. While it is not in our readings for Easter Sunday, my favorite telling of the Easter story is the one where the angel tells the two women, "Jesus is not here, He has gone on ahead of you. Go find Him!"

I love that image: that Jesus is not where we expected Him to be, but He has moved ahead, calling us to something new. That story is found throughout the Bible: Abraham was called to a new place, Moses was called to take his people out of Egypt into the Promised Land. Later, when the Israelites are driven out of their land, God calls them back to restore the temple in Jerusalem. The New Testament is filled with stories of the apostles leaving their homes to spread the gospel to new places.

We are also called to this. What we expect from life, even death itself, as seen in the story of Jesus, is changed. Jesus' friends and followers were shocked and saddened by the crucifixion, but at least they understood it: He was dead. It was over. And although it was tragic, it was explainable, understandable, expected. And then on Easter Sunday the women come to find that nothing is as they expected.

That is our call today: Don't assume anything. Expect that God is able to do remarkable, miraculous, life-changing things. We think we know how life is supposed to happen. And yet, the Resurrected Savior is always calling us to something new, something startling. It's uncomfortable, but it's what it means to be a person of faith.

I pray this Easter season is especially sacred for you. I also pray you find confidence and courage in the call Jesus is offering to you: **"Come to a new place. You'll find me there."**

Helen Caldicott once wrote, "We didn't inherit the earth from our parents, we have borrowed it from our children." She has a really good point. We did inherit some things from our parents, especially attitudes and habits that can have a profound effect on what the world will be like when we hand it over to those who come after us. It would do us all a world of good if we treated the world as if we were renting it from the future and wanted to return it in better shape than when we entered it so we can get our security deposit back.

We are Easter people. We believe that God can and will give all of creation a new birth, a resurrection life. But let's leave the timing of that up to God, shall we? Killing the planet simply because we believe that God can un-kill it would not reflect well on us. It's not a good look and it will upset our grandkids.

There is a lot of amazing work being done to develop new energy and transportation sources as quickly as possible (see https://www.sciencedaily.com/news/matter_energy/batteries/.) The world of science and technology has finally realized that we're on a pretty serious deadline here and that there's more at stake than impressing their colleagues. There is really hope for the future. It's slim, but it's there. We can help if we all figure out how we can conserve and contribute less to the problem. You're all using LED lightbulbs, right?

Your days and my days are numbered, but let's do what we can to make sure that the world God loves (John 3:16) has a much longer and healthier run.

COUNCIL UPDATE

We are a congregation of Christian servants dedicated to serve the needs of the local community and the mission of the church. We seek to accomplish this through prayer, worship and music, Sacraments, Christian stewardship, Scripture-based youth and adult education, community outreach, and fellowship. We do this in Thanksgiving for God's blessings.

For more than 25 year I have noticed our church mission statement over the piano in the Fellowship Hall. After attending a leadership meeting conducted by Bishop Brenda Bos, I have re-read it many times over. Our mission statement so accurately describes Gloria Dei and who we are, especially within the local community. So many wonderful people within our church family care for others as demonstrated through donations of time, monetary gifts, household items, gently used clothing and, especially, praying for each other.

LSS: We provided \$450 for the annual Easter celebration at LSS. The money was used to buy holiday food for families. Our noisy offering in April was \$217! We also made weekly deliveries of food and clothing. LSS said they especially needed men's clothing and thanks to Sandy Nelson, Bev Pandora's neighbor and Phil Como, we were able to provide much needed professional men's clothing.

Fe y Esperanza: Thanks to Pastor Steve and Meri we delivered a full truckload of household items. Plus, we have delivered items to support their upcoming Vacation Bible School from our unused Sunday school rooms. Additional monetary gift certificates have been provided to assist with their food pantry for their weekly distributions within their church family and local community.

Lydia House: Many hygiene items and gently used bedding were donated and given in support of women and their children.

Ukraine: Our church family donated over \$2800 in relief funds for Ukraine.

Worship: After 3 years we were finally back together in-person for a wonderful Easter celebration. It was so nice to see so many friends, families and visitors. Thank you to Pastor Steve for the many meaningful services he prepared throughout Lent, Holy Week and our joyous Easter morning. A special thank you to Sandy Nelson, Phil Como, Bob and Stephanie Siemer, Jean O'Connell, Frank Stanley and Marilyn Bittle for decorating our beautiful sanctuary. And a special thank you to Galen Anderson for the beautiful signage outside on the corner inviting the community to join us for worship. The wonderful music provided by Richard Hoover and solos by Phil Como added so much to our worship experience. We are so thankful for their talent and dedication!

Adult Education: Sunday mornings at 9:00 a.m. is a wonderful way to start your day with a discussion and overview on the Kingdom of God/Heaven. On Wednesday mornings at 10:00 a.m. via Zoom we continue with our learning about Christian Mysticism. Pastor Steve prepares such insightful studies to deepen our understanding of just how much we are loved by God.

Landscaping: In early May repair work on some broken sprinklers and lighting will be done. Some new pavers and ground cover will also be installed in the parkway to enhance the appearance of the front of our church. Some new plants will be added and some will be replaced. Thank you to the Siemers for their generous donation to offset the expense.

AC/HVAC and Roof: We have received over \$2500 in gifts to offset the cost of our AC/HVAC and roof repairs. This amount reflects approximately 25% of what is needed for this project. Thank you for your prayerful consideration in making these gifts. The work will begin in early October so there is still time to make a donation to this fund.

Congregational Meeting: Put May 15th on your calendar and plan to attend our annual congregational meeting immediately following worship. We will meet in-person and lunch will be provided. This is very important meeting to review our spending plan year-to-date and to elect new council members. Please prayerfully consider serving on our church council.

ELCW: The group will resume their meetings on May 12th. Join us for a short devotional message, wonderful fellowship, fun projects and a delicious salad and dessert; bring a sandwich to share. We meet at 11:00 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall.
