Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes - February 3, 2019

ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES - February 3, 2019 HOLY TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH San Carlos, California

Opening Formalities:

- Call to Order The meeting was called to order by our President, Barbara Padilla, at 11:30 AM, with a count of 35 members in attendance and the declaration that a quorum was present. (See written signin sheet with original member signatures, attached hereto.) Reference was made to the 31-page printed, published and distributed 2018 Annual Report, which is incorporated herein by reference. This was followed by an opening prayer by Pr. Josh and a photo slide show presentation of the past year's activities.
- The **Agenda** was presented and **Motion to approve** the Agenda was made and seconded and **passed without objection by voice vote**.
- **Meeting Minutes**: The Minutes from the 1/28/2018 Annual Meeting (See 2018 Annual Report, pages 5 & 6) were presented and **approved** on a voice vote after a motion was made (Bob Beuthel) and seconded (Pamela Bohlmann).

Reports:

- Treasurer (Petra Gilmore): See detailed written report at pages 7 through 17 of the Annual Report. . Petra noted that financial and budget matters were thoroughly explained and discussed at the annual congregational budget meeting on January 27th. A motion to approve the report was made by Bob Beuthel and seconded by Doug Southard and approved on voice vote. Barbara also acknowledged to applause Petra's 23 continuous years of loyal service as Treasurer.
- Pastor (Josh Serrano): See written report at page 18 of Annual Report. . . Pr. Josh gave a brief oral report, thanking all members for the great work they have done over the last year. He noted that we had received seven new members in 2018 and had one baptism, and characterized 2018 as a year of transitions. Looking forward, he sees 2019 as a year of growing relationships, which he hopes to help further by meeting personally for significant time with each and every member, a process already begun.
- **President's Report (Barbara Padilla):** See written report at page 19 of the Annual Report. Barbara also presented general comments expressing her personal thanks to all who have offered their time and talents in furthering HTLC's mission.
- Nominating Committee Report: See written report at page 19 of the Annual Report, listing each of
 the proposed officers and committee members nominated for office in 2019. Barbara Padilla
 acknowledged and thanked Bob Beuthel and Anita Reimann for their six years each of distinguished
 service on the Church Council, with many notable accomplishments.
- Committee Reports: See detailed written reports of various committees (Building & Grounds, Endowment, Evangelism and Outreach, Mutual Ministry, Worship and Music, Technology, Social Concerns, Stewardship, Women of ELCA and Youth Ministry and Sunday School), located at pages 20 through 28 of the Annual Report. Committee Chairs also presented brief oral reports highlighting the purpose and activities of their respective committees in 2018 and going forward into the new year.

Action Items:

• Motion to Approve 2019 Budget: See proposed budget as presented on pages 29 and 30 of the Annual Report. See also attached copy of the modified and corrected Proposed Budget, replacing page 29, which was handed out at the meeting. (The amendment was required to reflect a \$300 per year increase for pulpit supply costs, based on new Synod guidelines.) Discussion and comment ensued, wherein it was suggested by Pr. Kemp that, going forward, we might restructure the budget line items to make our benevolences first of the list, rather than last, in view of our call to give our "first".

fruits" tithing to God. A consensus agreed. . . . A motion was made by Doug S. to approve the budget , seconded by Pr. Kemp S. and Bob Beuthel, **approved** on a voice vote, with no "nays" registered.

- Receipt of Pledges: Members were called forward deposit their pledge cards for 2019 into the offering basket. These were received with a prayer of thanks by Pr. Josh, asking for them to be blessed for the work of God's Kingdom. . . Petra reminded all of the ease and efficiency of the "Simply Giving" automatic payment program and distributed application forms for those interested.
- Motion to Approve Slate of Officer Candidates: See proposed slate on page 19 of the Annual Report. A motion to approve the slate of nominees was made by John McDowell and seconded by Pr. Josh and approved by voice vote, with no "nays" registered.

Closing Prayer: A closing prayer was given by Pr. Josh.

III – 2019 Treasurer's Financial Report

2019 Budget Highlights

Giving

- General Fund giving was \$243,645, a 7% increase over 2018 (\$221,313)
- 2019 General Fund giving was \$10,256 above expenses (\$233,389)
- In addition, designated giving was \$30,054 (includes Spring Forth)
- Significant giving in December \$62,839 (\$42,500 over monthly average)
- Giving met the monthly budget goal (\$19,143) only 25% (3 months) of the time

Expenses

- Total 2019 expenses @ \$233,338; 6.7% higher than 2018
- Total expenses were \$3,670 higher than budget due to large Benevolences as result of higher December giving
- At or under budget in 33 of 39 categories
- Line items over budget:
- Pastor Benefits, Payroll Taxes, Waste, Printing, Adult Ed.

Account Balances

- 2019 ended with \$96,546 in checking/savings:
 - \$76,546 ending balance in General Fund checking/savings
 - \$20,000 Contingency Fund (Emergencies); This fund is in a special savings account with Mission Investment Fund (goal to maintain 10% of budget as a contingency)
- 2019 ended with positive account balances
- Large giving in December is positive, but creates planning insecurity
- Need increased giving throughout the year





Cumulative Receipts Chart – 10 Year History




General Funding Sources Chart




Monthly Giving vs. Budget Goal



d. Other Committee Reports

Building and Grounds

Currently, the B&G team is comprised of Leroy Padilla, Doug Southard, G. Ray Martin, John Schornstein, and Ian Schornstein. Much appreciation goes to Bob Beuthel and James Reimann who transitioned off of the team formally during 2019 but continued support multiple projects.

B&G routinely completed several activities "behind the scenes" including:

- Weekly trash, recycle and compost removal
- Managing timers for lights and irrigation
- Routine furnace monitoring and filter changes
- Replacing burnt out bulbs and replacing light fixtures as needed
- Managing service providers (landscaping and janitorial)
- Ordering and stocking kitchen, custodial and maintenance supplies
- Changing out church decorations

Our regular congregational workdays of **Spring Sparkle and Fall Freshen garnered 17 and 14 volunteers respectively**. These events resulted in sprucing up the church (window washing, brass shining, and pew dusting / polishing, etc.) and catching up on landscaping / pruning. Several small repair projects were also completed.

Beyond the planned activities described above, several other projects kept the team busy such as:

- *Irrigation system repair:* The primary areas of attention were the church entry, Glenwood hill and parsonage backyard and stemmed from general wear and tear as well as overly aggressive landscapers. This will require further attention in 2020.
- **Furnace repair**: We had some bad luck in early and late 2019 with two different furnace problems requiring repair or upgrades. Fortunately, funds could be found for these unplanned failures and **Leroy Padilla** was key in supporting this effort with coordination of repair estimates bids and work oversight.
- **Carpet replacement**: **Doug Southard** was instrumental in working with the Church Council to secure financial support for the replacement of the carpet in Beilstein Hall. He went further to get estimates, coordinate the installation and rehabilitate the wood panels at the front of the stage. There is now beautiful continuity from the sanctuary to Beilstein Hall.
- **Bench at church** entry: **Thanks to a generous gift from the Webb family**, we have a lovely new bench adorning the church entry. The team assembled and permanently secured the bench. **Gail Blomstrom** added the finishing touch by crafting a custom bench cushion.
- Termite remediation: Termites were noted for a very brief period near two of the windows in the
 parsonage. After inspections and estimates, we hired experts for an isolated professional treatment.
 The B&G team performed other suggested precautionary measures such as soil and tree stump
 chemical treatment, soil removal, and elimination of stored wooden items from the crawl space area in
 the parsonage.
- **Gutter repair**: Heavy rains required reattachment of a small portion of the parsonage gutter ensuring proper slope for drainage and a secure attachment.
- **Tree pruning**: Adjacent to the parsonage, a couple of trees required pruning in multiple stages to prevent structural damage to a fence and tree entanglement with utility lines. This required several sessions to prune and then cut the limbs into manageable sizes for weekly curbside pick-up along with the trash.

- **Sign repair**: The damage to the plastic cover of the hillside corner sign was repaired with the replacement of a higher strength, impact resistant material. This was a bit of a puzzle to figure out the frame disassembly, but hopefully it will not require attention for several more years.

The B&G team prides itself on being frugal and skilled just enough to manage much of the routine maintenance and required repairs in order to keep costs down. **Leroy Padilla** has been able to work with the landscaping and janitorial service providers to modify schedules to further reduce the cost impact to the 2020 church budget.

Looking forward in 2020, some special projects that we expect will likely require attention include: Cleaning, organizing, and enhancing storage and closet areas (e.g., chair room in Beilstein Hall, holiday and church decorations room near office)

- Exterior door maintenance and surface finishing
- Parking lot and adjacent landscaping may need some improvements

As we begin a new decade, it is vital to maintain our landscaping, irrigation, and campus facilities wisely and efficiently for the future. Please consider being the "eyes" and "ears" to help direct our attention to good stewardship care.

Endowment Committee

Establishment Of The Endowment Fund

In 1947, Pastor Emmett Beilstein and his wife, Alice, began Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, a mission congregation in San Carlos. Pastor Beilstein believed that every member of Holy Trinity was empowered by the Holy Spirit to give generously, all according to their ability, to share the life-giving Gospel boldly and effectively in word and deed, and joyfully help those in need, both within and beyond the congregation.

In 2003, in an expression of those beliefs, a portion of the Beilstein's estate was gifted to Holy Trinity, part of which was used to establish our Endowment Fund as a continuing and lasting means to further God's Word in the congregation, the community, and the world.

The Endowment Fund provides a means for us, as Christian stewards, to express our deep gratitude for God's many blessings to us.

Endowment Fund Distribution And Finances

In 2019 the Endowment Committee recommended to the Church Council a distribution of \$4,200 from 2018 funds for carpet replacement in Beilstein Hall. Later in the year as the estimates for the cost of replacement grew, the Committee recommended an added \$4,500 distribution. This distribution was from projected 2019 end of year funds (which normally would be distributed in 2020). Because of this early distribution, no recommendations for distribution of funds will be made in 2020.

In 2019, the Endowment Fund received no donations. The Fund began the year with a balance of \$100,536.07. After market fluctuations and the distributions to support specific projects noted above, the Fund ended 2019 with a balance of \$101,060.29.

Why Does Holy Trinity Have An Endowment Fund?

Our Endowment Fund provides our members and friends a vehicle for leaving a legacy to Holy Trinity. It serves as an annual reminder of faith and witness of each donor. Plus, it multiplies your gift by combining it with gifts of others that grow under professional financial management.

Moreover, it supplies a way to receive large gifts that will not overwhelm the congregation or discourage on-going stewardship and annual giving. Finally, a healthy endowment ensures a source of funding through regular distributions to support projects not included in the annual budget.

How Is The Fund Managed?

The Endowment Committee manages Holy Trinity's Endowment Fund, encouraging donations to the fund, and recommends distribution amounts to the Council. Prudent annual distributions allow for protection of principal and possible growth in a fluctuating market while allowing for support of key Holy Trinity priorities not covered by our operating budget.

We invest our Endowment Fund with the InFaith Community Foundation (formerly the Lutheran Community Foundation) in their "medium risk" fund. While the fund grows consistent with our risk profile

and market fluctuations, endowment funds typically experience significant principal growth through donations rather than through investment gains.

How Does The Endowment Fund Support Congregational Priorities?

The Council, acting on the recommendations of the Committee, has authorized distributions to support our youth, our music program, our seniors, pastor relocation expenses, carpet for Beilstein Hall, and more. Best practices have the Council (on advice from the Committee) issue a 4.5% annual distribution of the Endowment Fund's prior end of year closing balance.

How Can You Help Our Endowment Fund Growth?

The Endowment Fund allows members and friends of Holy Trinity to leave a legacy for the long-term future of our congregation. Planned giving is the best way that members can support our Endowment Fund. That means creating a specific plan for a gift that typically goes beyond those one makes throughout the course of a year. Moreover, it goes beyond "over and above" gifts made to capital and other campaigns such as our recent Spring Forth! effort.

Your dreams make each gift unique and important; planned giving is not only for the wealthy – God blesses us all. Planned gifts to our church Endowment Fund ensure our mission will continue into well the future.

In consultation with a financial advisor, you may consider allocating a percent of your estate to Holy Trinity, making the church a beneficiary of an insurance contract or IRA, or donate other assets such as real estate. There are multiple ways you can support the mission of the church; the choice is up to you!

Mutual Ministry Committee

- Serve as a "focus group" representative of the congregation, as leaders share ideas of ministry and seek to assess how best to accomplish what is being proposed.
- Support the Pastor's need for spiritual self care, compensation, sabbaticals, and continuing education.

The Mutual Ministry Committee met four times in 2019. In addition to Pastor Josh, the three other committee members are Greg Bohlmann (chair), Barbara Richards, and Erik Vorhes. From the ELCA stewardship website:

As members of the ELCA, we believe that we are freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor. How do we respond to God's call to serve and love our neighbors? We faithfully steward the gifts God has so abundantly given to us. Although some think of stewardship as only a financial response to God's love, stewardship encompasses so much more than money. It is about how we use all that God has entrusted to our care — our time, our talents and our treasures — to love God and our neighbors, both inside and outside of the church walls and our homes.

2019 began with January being declared "Celebrate Epiphany as a Season of Giving," and changing the fall pledge campaign to coordinate members' pledge commitments directly with adoption of the annual budget. Through the weekly Sunday bulletin and the monthly Trinity Topics, members were kept informed of monthly giving vs. expenditures and the adopted budget. October 31, 2019, concluded with a budget deficit of \$30,520; however, a December "deficit reduction" campaign pushed the 2019 end-of-year receipts \$10,256 over expenses.

Holy Trinity lives the ELCA stewardship statement, and continues to celebrate stewardship throughout the year focusing on its many different dimensions. To that end, some of the 2019 stewardship-related activities included:

- Monthly "Stewardship Notes" page in Topics
- Advocating Simply Giving or direct deposit giving to insure regular giving even when not in church
- Focusing on gratitude for all God has given us; emphasizing leveraging resources via Thrivent Choice and Amazon Smile dollars being directed to church
- Working with key Ministry Teams and developing/distributing a Time and Talent survey based specifically on Teams' needs. The results were given to the Ministry Teams for follow-up.
- Highlighting being good stewards beyond our earthly life through estate planning
- Focusing on capital stewardship and celebrating paying off the Spring Forth renewal loan early which saved on interest payments
- Highlighting that gratefulness/generosity increases with intentionality
- Encouraging special December giving to erase the budget deficit
- Developing the calendar for 2020 pledge campaign and stewardship celebration to coincide with the 2019 Annual Meeting

While Holy Trinity's general fund giving did not meet its adopted budget until December giving, this congregation continues to be exceedingly generous with its financial resources and time, and embodies the ELCA statement of using those resources both inside and outside the church.

Editorial Note: While there was an increase December giving, monthly receipts kept pace with the adopted budget only 25% (3 months) of the time which resulted in a seriously reduced budget flow. This caused the Council to question whether or not funds would be available to meet expenses. The congregation must actively focus on increased giving throughout the year.


Service events

c. Constitution Changes

Second by:

Annual Meeting Date (C10.01.01)

Council recommends this Constitution change to accommodate adequate time for planning with year-end financial closing:

"C10.01.01 The annual congregational will be held in January or February each year. The specific date shall be set early enough for adequate planning. Notification of the date will be made to the congregation at least one month prior in order to provide adequate planning and scheduling time for all members of the congregation."

Motion: Approve Constitution change in article C10.01.01 for annual meeting date from "January" to "January or February".

Council Member Number and Term (C12.01 & C12.02)

The Council recommends this Constitution change to create a more reasonable path for members to serve on Council:

C12.01. The voting membership of the Congregation Council shall consist of the pastor(s), a minimum of eight seven congregation members plus one youth member if so determined (effective January 27, 2013 February 2, 2020). Any voting member of the congregation may be elected, subject only to the limitation on the length of continuous service permitted in that office. A member's place on the Congregation Council shall be declared vacant if the member a) ceases to be a voting member of this congregation; or b) is absent from four successive regular meetings of the Congregation Council without cause; or c) resigns office for any reason and or d) chooses not to run for a second or third term. Consistent with the laws of the state in which this congregation is incorporated, the congregation may adopt procedures for the removal of a member of the Congregation Council in other circumstances.

C12.02. The members of the Congregation Council, except excluding the pastor(s), shall be elected by written ballot to serve for 3 two years or until their successors are elected. Such members shall be eligible to serve no more than two three full terms consecutively. Their terms shall begin at the close of the annual meeting at which they are elected.
