The COVID-19 forced exile from our church building has led us to gather anew. We worship as community through Zoom, learning once again that God is present everywhere. We work to keep in touch, by telephone, and during virtual coffee hour. Our choir once again sings "together" thanks to the talents of Richard Lloyd, our minister of music and the "magic" of digital mixing. Parish members join us from Florida, Maine and other far flung places, and we welcome our guests from the North Country. We have been blessed; God is good.

The Office of the Bishop of the Diocese of Central New York has approved our Covenants of Regathering Anew. These pledges of how we plan to share God's love and hope while helping to slow the spread of COVID-19 can be viewed at <u>https://stjamesclinton.org/coronavirus1</u>. We are slowly inviting people back into our building, in phases, prioritizing groups that cannot function remotely. The St. James' Day School will start in early September. We hope to bring AA (Alcoholics Anonymous) back in late September. Both groups met the Diocesan category of essential outreach groups.

As Episcopalians, we are a sacramental people longing to be physically in the same place, and be in the presence of the Eucharistic table. We held our first outdoor service on Saturday August 22 at St. Margaret's House, New Hartford. We hope to hold a few more outdoor services while the weather remains good. Meanwhile, the Regathering Committee and representatives of the Worship Committee are paving the way to fully hybrid indoor worship services in our little yellow building on Williams Street. This is more complex than the typical livestream. It will take time, as we enhance our digital infrastructure, and re-envision our worship services.

This COVID-19 induced pause might be a good time to reflect on what we, as St. James, are called to become. What does worship look like in a world of physical distancing and mask wearing, and no singing? How do we ensure that those joining us digitally are incorporated as worshipers, not just as silent onlookers? What new mission opportunities might the Holy Spirit lead us to? How will we experience God's love for us, and our love for each other: love in the time of COVID and beyond? Scripture is all about new beginnings. Surely, God will be with us, as we open up this new chapter of St. James, Clinton. May we give thanks for what was, and may we move forward in trust and gentleness, as we continue our journey ingathering anew.

# What is St. James Doing in Response to COVID-19?

Everyone on the premises, outside and inside, must wear a face mask that covers the mouth and nose at all times, and maintain 6 foot distancing.

Our Sexton Mustafa ("Mujo") Salkic continues to clean and maintain the building and grounds. Areas used by groups will be disinfected before and after each meeting. All "high touch" surfaces are disinfected regularly.

Our office administer, Caitlin Richer, continues to work from home. She checks e-mail and voice mail regularly as well as posted items.

We are in the process of installing touchless sanitizer dispensers throughout the building and touchless soap dispensers by all sinks.

We are keeping a log of everyone entering the building - at this stage, only our staff and essential volunteers. Per NYS guidelines, each visitor attests they have not been diagnosed with COVID-19, do not have COVID-19 symptoms and do not meet any other NYS COVID-19 criteria that would bar them from entry.

#### Update from our Vestry

A few weeks ago, we wrote to you that the pandemic has allowed us to be more creative in our search for a new priest. The Vestry has taken on the role that it once delegated to the search committee, and has worked closely with the diocese and with an interview team made up of fellow parishioners to help with the process.

After our recent virtual Vestry meeting, we can now report to you that we are getting closer to the end of the search process and have identified a wonderful pastoral candidate whom we believe will be an excellent fit for St. James. We still have to sign a Letter of Agreement and have it approved by Bishop DeDe. By its very nature, the search process must remain confidential, but we hope that we'll be able to share some joyful news with you soon.

In the meantime, as with all things in this age of COVID-19, the Vestry continues to meet via Zoom, learning and adapting as we go. One thing we have not forgotten, however, is that while all of us at St. James miss being together in church, and we miss the Eucharist, the singing, the fellowship dinners and other gatherings, we know that this is a time to be what the church really is -- a time to reach out to others, to keep others in our prayers, and to help those who need our assistance.

We hope that you are successfully adjusting to this most unusual period, both physically and spiritually. Please join us in a prayer for the parish: "Almighty and everliving God, ruler of all things in heaven and earth, hear our prayers for this parish family. Strengthen the faithful, arouse the careless, and restore the penitent. Grant us all things necessary for our common life, and bring us all to be of one heart and mind within your holy church; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Book of Common Prayer, p. 817)

#### June Meeting Highlights

The June vestry meeting was held via Zoom on June 17, 2020. The vestry approved signing up for the Community Solar Project, and passed the revised 2020 Budget. An update was given from the Regathering Committee. The vestry agreed to create an anti-racism statement and invite the Clinton Area Ministerium to partake in a community statement.

#### **July Meeting Highlights**

The July vestry meeting was held via Zoom on July 15, 2020. The Regathering Committee discussed updates, including the need to submit Covenants for Regathering to the diocese for approval. Committee meeting minutes were given to the vestry. Mark Linderman has become the chair of Property Management. Issues with the property were discussed and Caitlin will provide information from previous meetings to Mark Linderman.

#### **August 5 Special Vestry Meeting Highlights**

A special meeting of the vestry took place via Zoom on August 5, 2020. The vestry unanimously passed motions to submit two Covenants for Regathering; one for building use, and the other for outdoor gatherings. The vestry also unanimously passed motions to allow essential outreach groups such as the St. James' Church Day School and Alcoholics Anonymous to begin using the building with contingencies.

The complete vestry minutes are available for parishioners to read in the library. The Clerk of the Vestry binder is located on top of the bookshelf. Minutes will be available in the binder following their approval by the vestry.

Arianna brings enthusiasm and positive energy to the program.

With the COVID-19 virus continuing to affect everyone's lives, we are hopeful that a preschool experience for our students will give them some normalcy with in- person playtime and learning time at St. James' Day School. We feel fortunate to have a secluded, safe space that can be sanitized daily. We also believe that a small number of students with two teachers is healthy and feasible during this pandemic.

Thank you so much to the re-gathering committee, the church wardens and all the St. James' Church community for the continued support of the Day School. The preschool experience that is offered at St. James' Church is so important for young children to get ready for kindergarten; plus the opportunity to learn how to get along with others and to be thoughtful and kind is needed in the world today.

# **Treasurer's Corner**

This is my first Vestry term in a number of years. When we needed a new Treasurer this year the Vestry asked me to do it again (I previously served 5 years when Ray and Jenny were Rectors). I immediately turned to Jan Wilson and Patty Fox for help, and they are serving as full-charge Bookkeeper and Accounts Receivable/Payable, respectively. Our small team provides important financial reporting to the Vestry. But we can use help, so if you would like to join us please raise your hand!

I am reporting to the Congregation that St. James is a financially viable institution and can fulfill our mission. Because of your support and generosity, our budget is balanced, we have the wherewithal to call a new priest, and we have a real future to look forward to.

That's not to say we don't have challenges. If I may speak personally, I'm recovering from a difficult relationships with our 2 previous Rectors. Your experiences are surely just as personal, but the fact that you (and I) are still parishioners speaks our truth. I only want to recognize our traumas because it is our path to healing: our first challenge.

The second challenge I see is parish growth. We are blessed with bequests that has pushed our endowment to almost \$2M (thank you to not only our donors, but the Finance Committee for their stewardship). From that we take about \$50K annually, about ¼ of our budget. I wish to recognize our previous Vestry's restraint in preserving our principal that benefits us today, but we need to look towards building an even more vibrant community. 20 years ago we had about 120 families and now we have about 60. This is a complicated problem; I expect we'll focus and work with the Diocese to address it.

I would be remiss if I did not recognize our parish leadership for their accomplishments this year. Our Wardens (Chris and Wendy) have responded very creatively to trying times. Patricia Jue has led our response to the Covid19 pandemic with internal controls and a plan for our future. Her recent \$10K motion, approved by the vestry, to invest in audio/visual kit to include remote parishioners when we get back to "normal" is not only innovative; it is the first step for us being a national or international community. That's pretty cool and we can thank Patricia and her committee for proposing new ideas for how "church" might be different for us going forward.

In closing, I'd like to express reassurance. Our Wardens are committed. Our finances are sound. Our Vestry is working really hard. I think we are a church that invites everyone to participate as they can, and I hope you will join in as you can!

#### St. James' holds first in-person service since March

On Saturday, August 22 St James' held it's first in-person worship service since March. Following the approval of a Covenant for Gathering Anew: Outdoor Gatherings, St. James' leadership was able to plan an outdoor in-person service held at St. Margaret's House in New Hartford. The outdoor service was limited to 25 attendees, including a celebrant and readers,



and physical distancing and mask wearing were required. Father John Crosswaite presided the service with Gail Prentice and Nancy Taylor as lector and lay eucharistic minister.

Monetary donations are used to purchase food from the

Food Bank of Central New York and to help pay for refrigerated trucks that brings donation of perishable food on distribution days.



#### **Outreach News**

The Outreach Committee met on August 23 after church, via Zoom. The committee discussed the local participation in the Rise Against Hunger (RAH) initiative, in which we've taken part the past few years. The representative from the Clinton United Methodist church, which spearheads the local effort, has informed us that the event is scheduled for October 3rd, and, as of now, is still expected to happen.

The local group has been in touch with RAH as well as the Clinton Central School (CCS) administrators regarding protocol in light of COVID 19.



RAH has added several new guidelines at events in order to abide by social distancing, mask wearing, and other CDC suggested guidelines. CCS is still willing at this time to allow the group to use its HS gym for the event. The group will be required to provide the school with a written plan that follows CDC guidelines (just as St. James is currently doing with its plans for the Diocese). We will keep everyone apprised of the status of the event, for those who wish to participate.

Since we had not planned on this event happening, and due to other complications caused by the virus, the Outreach committee and St. James have not held any fundraisers for the event. However, the committee approved to donate \$1000 from its budget to the initiative.

The committee also voted to donate another \$2000 to the Country Pantry. (We had given \$1000 earlier this spring.) We applaud the amazing and vital work that the Pantry does to assist our local neighbors.
