From the Rector

I love the season of Advent. I am deeply drawn in by its prayerfulness, its hope and expectation. I love its invitation to silence and quiet reflection. I find myself startled and renewed by God's gracious invitation to open to him and keep watch. Advent is quite naturally a season of contemplation—it calls us to prayer, alertness, patient vigilance; it asks us to practice peaceful living and be generous of spirit.

I would like to share with you my spiritual practice in Advent, in part, because by being publicly accountable helps me remain faithful to what I have discovered is vitally important to me, but also because I hope to encourage you to adopt a similar but fitting practice. I rise each day and begin my prayer by slowly reading a paragraph or two from a spiritual classic for about 5-10 minutes. What is important is that this be something we consider to be inspired. Sometimes I read a psalm. Recently I have been reading from the Conferences of John Cassian. (Even though the spiritual "classics" are centuries old it is amazing how readable and inspiring they can be!) I then set a timer and sit in silent prayer for about forty-five minutes. I repeat this once again in the afternoon—usually when I have some unscheduled time. In my experience, silence is the best way that I can spend time with God. John of the Cross called silence "God's first language." During this time I am removed from the distractions and busyness of the outside world as I seek to let go of any attachment to the incessant chattering of my mind so that I can give myself in true silence, totally to God. What God does during this time is totally up to God. Sometimes I settle


immediately into a delicious silence. Other times, my mind never quiets down. One of the wonderful graces of this kind of prayer is it teaches you pretty quickly that you can't control it! My intention is that through this practice I may be freed from the tyranny of my own self-centered agenda and allow God through his grace to ground me in his love and peace.

For some, the amount of time may sound like a lot. Please bear in mind that I have been practicing contemplative prayer for years and have gradually been building-up to my current practice. The important thing about prayer is that we just do it—as the sneaker people say. If you want to learn to pray, the best way is to pray. It generally takes about twenty minutes for the mind to quiet down enough that we might enter some state of interior silence. Just as you can't drain a bathtub immediately, contemplative prayer takes time. If you feel moved, I encourage you to spend twenty minutes a day (or more) in silent prayer until Christmas. Think of all the other ways we spend twenty minutes without a second thought: Talking on the phone, surfing the internet, watching television. We can make time. The work of Advent to receive Christ in our hearts and in our world requires something of us. Our preparation begins when we open to God, listen to God, wait for God, love and adore God. Just as athletes train their bodies to compete, it is important that we condition our spiritual lives, not just for ourselves but for those around us and the world. When we open ourselves to the God of peace and consent to his grace, we can be healed of the violence and destruction that is part of the human condition.

It is my hope this Advent that our prayer may deepen in to contemplation. This Advent, may you keep watch and be faithful as God transforms your hearts to receive the gift of peace this Christmas.

Vestry News

At the November 18th meeting, the vestry received the finance report from Craig Heuss, chair of the finance committee. In general, we remain on target for our budget, and will remain so as long as parish members are faithful to their pledges. Gordon Jones gave an update on the Stewardship Campaign, as Blair, chair of the Stewardship committee, was out of town. We expect to meet our target goal as long as we continue to have a few new pledges, and those who pledged last year pledge at a slightly increased level this year.

We approved the formation of a Memorial Fund committee. We appointed Blair Jones and Matt Weber as members of the Safe Church Response Team. More on these committees can be found in separate articles of this newsletter.

The rest of the meeting, the vestry did some visioning for the future. We broke up into four groups to discuss how the vestry helps support the parts of our mission statement; (1) to develop spiritually (2) find opportunities for outreach; (3) receive comfort when in need; and (4) engage in sacred experiences, and how as a vestry group we help each other grow in these areas. We discussed ways of being more intentional in developing the outreach focus of the entire parish. There was a great feeling of energy, and hope. We felt the Holy Spirit moving among us, and look forward to more vestry meetings where we discuss our vision for St. James, find ways to empower all in our service of God's mission, and become more passionate leaders in Christ's body.

Christmas for All

Sometimes the perfect gift for someone who has everything, or someone who does not need more "stuff" is the true spirit of Jesus Christ – giving to those less fortunate. Some possible suggestions for Christmas giving on an international level are: Episcopal Relief and Development, UNICEF, the Heifer International Project, CARE, and Bread for the World. All of these organizations have gift giving catalogs on the web. There are some print copies at the back of the church. Local organizations include: Hope House, Hospice, the Rescue Mission, the Church of the Good Shepherd or countless others. What a wonderful tradition to begin or continue.

If you want to give a present, consider purchasing a fair trade item. To find organizations that sell fair trade items, go to www.fairtradefederation.org/ or simply look for the fair trade logo on items.

Another gift possibility is the Bishops Blend Coffee and Tea Christmas Boxes (Great for Christmas, Great for Small Farmers!). Episcopal Relief & Development and Pura Vida Coffee offer these Christmas boxes for under \$30. The boxes feature fair trade, organic, shade-grown Bishop's Blend coffees and teas; see "http://puravidacoffee.e-beans.net/private_label/".

Ministry Opportunities

Vestry Clerk - Duties include taking the minutes of each meeting, sending out notices of meeting times, and handling light vestry correspondence (i.e. occasional thank you notes on behalf of the vestry). The vestry meets the third Wednesday of each month at 7pm. While the clerk has no voting privileges and is expected to maintain confidentiality, this is a great opportunity for someone to be more active within the community of the church. In 2011, the vestry hopes to do more future-looking and big-picture discussions. The meetings promise to hold much excitement.

Altar Guild – This ministry group helps prepare the altar for each service. We rotate so any one of us serves for about 6-8 weekends per year, working either Saturday or Sunday. This is a great ministry for someone who prefers to work behind the scenes, and for short periods of time. At our annual meetings, the altar guild members discussed how as a ministry group, we enable all parts of the St. James mission statement; our service helps us develop spiritually, facilitating worship helps others develop spiritually while engaging in sacred experiences, and we find opportunities for outreach and providing comfort when altar flowers are taken to our shut-ins.

Contact the rector, a warden or the church office if you are interested in this or any other ministry group. Alternately, contact the chair of a ministry group.

Memorial Funds

The vestry approved the formation of a Memorial Fund Committee. The committee is empowered to purchase non-consumable items to enhance our worship. The idea is to have a small group of parish members who can intentionally look for ways to honor those in whose name memorial donations have been given. Members include the Rector, a warden, a member of the altar guild (Cynthia Crossley) and a member of the worship and formation committee (Wendy Weber). There is one more opening on the committee. If you are interested in serving, or have suggestions for items, please contact a committee member. If you are interested in giving a donation in memory of a departed loved one, contact Jan Wilson (treasurer) or simply write a check to St. James with "Memorial Fund" and the name of the person on the memo line. All donations are placed in a separate, dedicated account, and are never used as part of our operating budget.

....and our new Advent Wreath

Most recently, Memorial Funds were used to purchase the frame for our new Advent wreath. It hangs over the altar during this Advent Season. The frame was made by Joel A. Schwartz of Schwartz's Forge and Metalworks, Inc., Deanboro. Mr. Schwartz's work has been featured in the *Architectural Record*, *Art in Architecture*, *Home & Garden*, *House Beautiful*, and *The New York Times*. We, at St James, are fortunate to have one of his creations enhance our worship (and at a very modest cost). Thanks goes to Ken Iles for arranging the designs and purchase and to Fr. Tim and Ken for the greens.

Safe Church Training

On November 13, around 40 people from our parish and other district parishes attended Safe Church training at St. James. People came from as far south as Hamilton and from up north in Barneveld. Our thanks goes the Rev. John Stonesifer of Grace Church, Utica, for leading this session, and to the Rev. Deacon Barbara Groves for her presence and support.

Safe Church Training is mandatory for all church clergy, wardens, vestry members, employees of the church, and volunteers who work with or around children or youth or who are licensed by the bishop as eucharistic visitors, eucharistic ministers, or worship leaders. The training must be taken once every 5 years, so if you are one of the many who had training with Jenny Montgomery in 2005, it is time to attend another session. According to the Diocese, similar training for public school work, the health care profession, or from other denominations or organizations cannot be substituted. The next scheduled training is Thursday, December 2nd, 7pm, at St. Paul's, Oxford. To register call Fr. Taylor at 607/847-6361. Once you have been trained, have Sharon Pick photocopy your certificate so we have a copy on file.

Our Safe Church Policy

We intend for St. James to be a safe and welcoming place for all people of any age. There has not been cause for concern, but it is good for all of us to know that since 2003, we have had a "Safe Church" policy regarding appropriate conduct. We are committed to protecting all persons from sexual misconduct by church workers, and volunteers. We comply fully with law enforcement officials and child protective services. All church workers receive professional conduct training (safe church training). Any event for children and youth (i.e. those under the age of 18) must be supervised by at least two adults, with at least one having received safe church training.

Furthermore, Blair Jones and Matt Weber serve on the Safe Church Response Team. The vestry plans to appoint two more representatives as more parish members receive safe church training. Members of this team serve as point people to receive complaints of misconduct, then investigate the complaints, make recommendations and/or consult with the pastor and wardens as appropriate. Concerns can then be taken to the Diocesan level, as appropriate. If you have any concerns about the appropriateness of any church activity, feel free to talk to Blair, Matt, one of the wardens or the rector. We will be discussing ways to open our hearts to Jesus during this season and finding time to reflect and pray amidst all of the wonderful holiday preparation. We will be lighting Advent candles and singing in our Children's Chapel, and the children will rotate through several different activities, including active games, drawing and craft projects.

We also look forward to the annual Christmas Pageant, written and directed by Sandra Love. This year's pageant will be on December 19th during the worship service.

Outreach

The Outreach group spent the remainder of our yearly budget on holiday expenses at Hope House, the Rescue Mission, the American Red Cross, the Country Pantry and the Salvation Army. We also sent donations to Episcopal Relief and Development to continue the work in Haiti and helped out with another youngster at the St. James Day School.

The proceeds of the Greens and Goodies sales are going to the Central Asia Institute. Many of you are familiar with the Institute through Greg Mortenson's book *Three Cups of Tea*. The mission of CAI is to promote and support community-based education, especially for girls, in remote regions of Pakistan and Afghanistan.
