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

The August Vestry meeting had a full agenda. We opened with a devotional and a prayer. Our guest was former warden Wendy Weber, who is the chair of the 2010 Stewardship Committee. Wendy asked the Vestry to consider starting the Stewardship Campaign in September. Since reading the book Transforming Congregational Culture by Anthony Robinson, we have discussed basing our budget for next year on the promised 2010 parish pledges. It was agreed that this was a good idea.


The Vestry voted to rent out the Rectory. The rent will include utilities and outside maintenance. We feel that it is a good idea to have someone living in the rectory rather than leaving it vacant during the Search process.

About the Search Process

News from the Search Committee

Dear Friends,

The members of the Search Committee (for a new Rector) have met as a group with Canon Karen Lewis, from the Bishop's office, and are in the planning stages of our search and discernment process.

As shared with us by Canon Lewis, "the process can be separated into stages, each of which requires a commitment of time and resources:

Preparation and Planning

Self Study

Clergy Search

Discernment

Discernment Call

Mutual Ministry. "

We are at the start of the Self Study stage. This stage is focused on helping us understand our strengths and weaknesses as a parish as well as our aspirations for our next rector. Our Self Study Subcommittee is headed by Matt Weber; working with Matt is Colleen Campbell, Chris Fox, Sandra Love, and Barbara McKnight. This subcommittee has specifically been charged with "lead[ing] our congregation through a process of self study seeking the congregation's consensus of their Ministry, Identity, Direction, Systems Functionality, Church Growth Capacity, History with Clergy, and Expectations for Future Clergy. The Self Study Committee will develop, and the Vestry will adopt, a parish profile and leadership criteria for the new clergy. The profile information and proposed compensation needs to be reviewed by the Bishop's office." It will then be posted on the central deployment website of the National (Episcopal) church.

As a first step in our Self Study process, we will be undertaking a Parish-wide Survey, working in September with a survey format provided by Holy Cow Consulting company. Please watch for announcements in the service bulletins, via email, and by regular mail for the various ways by which each Parish member will be able to complete the survey questionnaire.

"How long will it [the search] take?"

The length of time to complete any given stage of this process depends upon many variables, including the frequency of meetings, the willingness of members to work independently and collaboratively, issues that need to be addressed (i.e., it may be necessary to work on conflict resolution or financial challenges before proceeding with the search), the length of time required to develop a parish profile, delays due to holidays and vacations, etc. Flexibility is essential. The 'average' time from departure of a rector to the calling of a new rector is 12 to 18 months " (All quoted material is sourced from Parish Transition - Clergy Search Process, Diocese of Central New York.)

Please note that every member of your search committee is sworn to maintain confidentiality regarding the name and/or identity of all candidates.

Every Parish Member should be an active participant in this process. We look forward to your questions and comments and would welcome your help on our various subcommittees.

Children and Youth Ministry

Church School kick-off September 13

The children's formation program kicks off on September 13 with a five week workshop cycle on Jesus' disciples called "Twelve Who Changed the World." Children will learn about Jesus and the disciples as they cycle through kitchen, art, film, drama, and story workshops.

Here are some of the concepts we will explore:

- Jesus had many followers including 12 who helped him do God's work.
- The word "disciple" means "student" or "learner."
- The 12 disciples were ordinary people who helped to do extraordinary things.
- Jesus calls us to help do God's work too!

What does it mean to follow Jesus? What clues do we have from the first people who did it? How would a disciple act in real life situations that we experience at school, in our neighborhood, at home, and at church?

Grouping the children

Children need engaging, interactive learning experiences, but "engaging" and "interactive" can mean very different things for boys and girls, and for older and younger children. After a conversation with teachers and parents, we are trying something new for grouping the children in Church School. Girls age 4 through 2nd grade will be in one class, and girls in 3rd grade-8th grade in another class. All the boys will be in one class, with the older boys serving as mentors for the younger boys.

How can you help?

Volunteers are needed. We need 3-5 adults to be workshop teachers, doing the same workshop (drama, kitchen project, etc.) for several weeks in a row. We also need at least 3 "shepherds" who will travel with one group through all of the cycle workshops. Please let Jenn DeWeerth know if you are willing to help from Sept 13-Oct. 11.

Don't worry if you can't help this time. There will be more workshop cycles coming up as the year goes on. Later in October we'll be starting a unit on the Hebrew Bible figure of Samuel.

Spiritual Care for Children and Adults Book Reviews

It can be a challenge to find thoughtful and inspiring books that relate to our faith lives. In this new monthly column I'd like to recommend some books to you, and hope you'll also let me know your suggestions as well.

FOR ADULTS: Krista Tippett, host of the public radio show "Speaking of Faith," says, "Raising children is a great spiritual challenge that many of us live with day-to-day, but we so rarely call it that." Parenting raises our own spiritual questions anew. For children, faith begins not in abstractions "but in concrete everyday experiences."

Few books explore these themes as eloquently as In the Midst of Chaos: Caring for Children as Spiritual Practice (Jossey-Bass, 2007) by Bonnie Miller-McLemore, a Protestant theologian at Vanderbilt University. She states that most adults, because they have children, must ultimately come to grips with a spirituality that is not expressed through silence, solitude, and study but through interruptions, messes, confusion, and also, frequently, joy. McLemore talks about "sanctifying the ordinary." The book is a rich in practical theology, but is also filled with personal and practical examples of the kind of spiritual life that Christianity insists upon—a fleshy, embodied-incarnate-life that is shared and passed on not just at the altar tables in church but also the chaotic dinner table at home.

FOR CHILDREN: God Created (Augsburg Fortress, 2003) by Mark Francisco Bozzuti-Jones is illustrated by Jui Ishida. Motion-filled, lush paintings match the simple rhythmic words, bringing alive the ancient Genesis creation story. Bozzuti-Jones juxtaposes the water and the animals with specific human emotions and relationships to describe the vast diversity of what God has created. One phrase, "God created all these and much more, and much more..." echoes to the end, allowing children to join in affirming that "God created you!"

I've placed my copies of these books in the church library, and encourage you to borrow and enjoy them. Happy reading! Jenn DeWeerth Minister of Music

Treasurer's Corner

Everyone who made a pledge should have received a quarterly pledge statement. Please call the office or put a note in Jan Wilson's mailbox – located in the church hallway across from the water fountain – if you have any questions or concerns regarding your statement. Not only are the statements a record for the parishioner, but they also help us to discover any clerical errors that need to be adjusted. A few errors on some statements from late quarter were noted and corrected. Thank you to those parishioners for their assistance and patience.

Thanks to all for their donations over the summer months. As of the writing of this article, we are staying right on par with our anticipated funds. The vestry has authorized that the 2008-2009 budget be revised to reflect the following:

- An increase in supply clergy expenses.
- An increase in Lewis House utilities and maintenance expenses.
- A new line for Search Committee expenses.
- A decrease in the Rector Salary expenses. The revised 2009 budget will be available in the office after it is finalized and approved by the vestry and wardens.

We are trying a new process for the 2010 budget as recommended by the stewardship committee, and approved by the vestry and wardens. Budget requests forms went out to committee chairpersons in July, and were due back in mid-August. The plan is to have a preliminary projected budget ready for the September vestry meeting for their input and approval. Then the 2010 projections will be ready for the congregation to see and consider during the stewardship campaign in October. The vestry will then finalize the budget in December and January to be ready for the Annual meeting in January. We hope to have copies of the projected budget available in the office and in the back of the church as soon as the vestry has approved it. It will provide the preliminary target figures for income need for anticipated expenses in 2010. The diocese has recommended that we budget as if we have a full-time rector. More information will be shared as it is available.

About the Lewis House

On Wednesday July 22, a neighborhood meeting was held in the Parish Hall of St. James Church at 7:00pm. The purpose of the meeting was to present different use options for the Lewis house, the white house owned by St. James, which is next to our parking lot. There were approximately 40 attendees. There were about 10 residents of Williams St.

The three options for the Lewis house property were discussed:

- 1. Rehabilitate the house for St. James use.
- 2. Re-purpose the property for green space and parking.
- 3. Sell the property.

There was much discussion by everybody in attendance but no new options given for use of the property. Some people want St. James to use our investments to fix the property for various uses but our investment policy does not allow us to withdraw money for this purpose.

I kept track of the comments made at the meeting:

- Four people wanted to rehabilitate the house.
- Two people wanted to sell the house.
- Four people wanted to re-purpose the property.
- Ten people didn't want to tear the house down (no preference given for its use).

Not everybody made a statement.

Skip Beardsell, a resident of Williams Street and member of St. James, presented a petition signed by virtually all the residents of Williams Street. The petition states that the signers do not support the demolition of the Lewis house.

The vestry had a special meeting the following Wednesday to discuss the neighborhood meeting. The consensus was that the Lewis house has become a divisive issue within our church and we should resolve this issue as soon as possible. We hope to hear final presentations from people representing the rehabilitate and repurpose options in September and to make a decision after that.

Please speak to any vestry member – listed on page 2 – if you have any concerns. Also keep us in your prayers as we seek to decide this issue.

Outreach News


The Outreach group has recently approved two transactions. The first is to continue to support a scholarship fund for the St. James Day School. The fund is used to help families to pay the tuition costs of attending St. James Day School. This has been an ongoing effort by our Outreach to help families afford quality pre-school programming here in Clinton.

The second motion was to use the plate gathering for the weekend of the U2Charist (Saturday, August 29 and Sunday August 30) to help Moses Agapito's efforts to build a school and a health clinic in his home village in Sudan. Some of you may recall reading about Moses' efforts in some articles in the Utica Observer-Dispatch in the spring. Moses is a "Lost Boy" of Sudan because he was orphaned and forced to flee his home village in southern Sudan due to the civil war there in the 1980s and 90s. After many grueling months of walking and being nearly killed or starving to death several times, the boys made their way to a refugee camp in Kenya. From there, Moses was brought to the US. Moses is now a US citizen and continuing his education here in Central New York. We are pleased to be able to help him with this donation to his fundraising. Look for more news about Moses and how we at St. James can help in the future.

The Outreach Committee has some opportunities for you to help out our local community. Please see the Sunday bulletins and the hand outs in the back of the church and in the Parish Hall for specifics.

Building a school

The plate offering collected during the Saturday U2charist service on August 29 and the following Sunday service – August 30 – will be donated towards the Freedom Project to build a school and health clinic in Jebel Lado. It is the hometown of Moses Agapito.

Moses was forced to flee his native village in 1989. He made his way first to Kenya, then to the United States through the Refugee Resettlement Program sponsored by the Mohawk Valley Resource Center for Refugees. Moses, a recent graduate of Mohawk Valley Community College in Human Services, plans to continue his education.

On a recent visit back home, Moses met his fellow villagers who invited him to consider building a school. Moses has agreed to be the guiding force behind his school project. It is Moses' hope that the community of Upstate New York will join in his efforts to bring growth and encouragement to his former village.

Community Garden


