A contract was subsequently negotiated and a congregation meeting to approve Rev. Lazzara's call as St. Paul's settled 3/4 pastor was held on November 24. The congregation approved his call. His projected start date is January 5, 2025.

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What wonderful memories this season brings. Times from our childhood (believe it or not, I never got coal in my stocking - at our house coal only went in the furnace); decorating the



My decorating gets less and less each year, but the excitement is still the same. Some reminiscing as old things are unwrapped remembering where and why it means something special. One year the kids in Sunday School cut out the manger scene from black construction paper and we put it in the front window until it fell apart. Warm memories are the best at Christmas and I have so many. Good friends (old and new), a growing family (that I love with



all my heart) and the promise of a new beginning for us all. God sent his Son to show how to love and live. As we celebrate the birth of our Savior, let us remember the many blessings we have enjoyed this past year as we await the surprises He has for us in the coming year. I wish you all good health and much happiness this season and enjoy your holiday as you celebrate with your family and friends.



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This is the season of Advent, the coming of Christ, one of the most meaningful seasons of the Christian year. It is also one of the busiest times of the year and many people's favorite time of the year. How do we approach this complex time and maintain a sense of perspective? There are many sources of suggestions on how to do this. There are thousands of websites and a multitude of magazines that promise to teach you techniques to manage your time, budget, and expectations to make *this* year the best holiday season you have

ever had. There are stores eager to sell you just the right products to enhance your Christmas experience. Where do you start?

I have a modest suggestion. Take a step back and refresh your Advent season this year. That doesn't mean you have to throw out all your traditions, but consider approaching the holiday from two new perspectives. One is the music you choose to listen to and a second is what decorations you use. These perspectives don't define the season as a whole, but are places to start.

As far as the music you listen to, if you listen to the same music every year and cherish it, that's fine, but consider diversifying. It seems as if every artist in every genre has a seasonal album. Look to your favorite artists and see if they have seasonal albums or songs/videos you can download. Go to their website and check that out. Then consider artists outside your normal wheelhouse. Look at other artists in your favorite genre and see if they have Christmas albums, e.g., if you like country; look at country artists you don't normally listen to. Then there are albums that go beyond genres like Mariah Carey who is called the "Queen of Christmas," and who has multiple albums. There are many instrumental groups with holiday albums; Mannheim Steamroller and the Trans-Siberian Orchestra are two. Pentatonix is an a cappella group with dynamic harmonies doing Christmas songs. If you're nostalgic for old fashioned pop, Neil Diamond and Barbra Streisand both have Christmas collections with some songs not usually heard.

Consider unfamiliar individual songs. "It Wasn't His Child" is the only carol I know of about Joseph, performed by Trisha Yearwood. "Some Children See Him" is about the universal nature of the Baby Jesus. Andy Williams and James Taylor both have versions of this. "There's a New Kid in Town" and "Straw Against the Chill" are about the nativity, sung by Kathy Mattea. "Mary, Did You Know," has become popular and has been recorded by many artists. "Sing Hosanna, Hallelujah!" (New Christy Minstrels) and "We Need a Little Christmas" (various soundtracks) are two fun songs to download. Look at versions of familiar songs by artists new to you. "The Little Drummer Boy" has been recorded in a dynamic version by Jennifer Nettles and Idina Menzel, artists unfamiliar to most. Find all of these on YouTube. Taking just a little time can result in a much-expanded Christmas playlist.

Another way to refresh Advent is to rethink your decorations. Magazines, websites and TV shows can give you information on how to do this. You can buy or make decorations. I suggest that you consider the meaning *behind* any new decorations you choose. One meaningful "decoration" is the nativity set, or crèche, a representation of the birth of Jesus.

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Nativity sets can be purchased from many retail sources. They range in size from a small tree ornament with just Holy Family to a large table top set with dozens of pieces. There are even life-sized versions for outdoor display. Sets come in traditional garb, ethnic styles or more creative versions. If you do a Google search, you will be inundated with options. If you want a smaller universe to start, try Amazon or eBay. There are also websites that specialize in nativity sets - try a Google search.

Beyond the nativity set, what decorations are meaningful? Evergreens, real or artificial, symbolize eternal life, and bring color and scent (if real) to the home. Wreaths, being circular and having no end, also symbolize eternal life. The red bows that traditionally adorn evergreens and wreaths symbolize Christ's blood. Candles signify that the Light has come into the world; purple candles honor Advent. A white candle is the Christ candle. The lights on the tree also signify the Light of the world. Any motif with triangles refers to the Trinity - the Christmas tree itself is an example of this. Gold decorations symbolize Christ's kingship. The red stripes of candy canes mimic the marks of the whip on Jesus's back at the Crucifixion. The shape of the candy cane refers to the crooks of the shepherds. Doves are the sign of the Holy Spirit. Bells ring out the good news of the coming of the Messiah. Angels recall the heavenly choir that heralded his birth. The wrapped gifts echo the gifts brought by the Magi. Scented decorations, like clove-studded oranges, bring to mind incense offered to God.
